Democrats Make Pitch for Preservationist Vote

Encouraged by the highest primary vote in history, Democratic candidates for Farmington Township offices have promised a vigorous "people to people" campaign aimed at replacing the present administration in the November general election.

Farmington Democratic Chairman Aldo Vagnozzi told the party's monthly meeting that the primary election results indicate that the Democratic candidates have a good chance to win this Fall.

The party's candidates for office are: Vagnozzi for Supervisor; Elizabeth O'Connor for Clerk; Joyce Hungerford for Treasurer and Harri Berger and Harold Shipley for Trustees.

Vagnozzi pointed out that fewer than half of the primary voters cast ballots for the present office holders. "The present Supervisor received only about 37 per cent of all the votes cast for that office in the primary," Vagnozzi said, "indicating that about 63 per cent would rather have someone else in that office."

"The same is true for the offices of Clerk, Treasurer and Trustees. We welcome the support of all Republicans, Independents and Democrats, who by their votes indicated that they wished a new Township administration. There is room for all citizens to participate in our campaign."

Vagnozzi stressed the importance of electing all five Democratic candidates to give a new administration the votes on the Township Board needed to carry out improvements in traffic safety, building codes, health and other services.

"Many people do not realize that the Township Clerk and Treasurer are voting members of the Township Board. The reelection of the present holders of those offices coupled with the five Democratic Trustees would keep control in the hands of the present administration."

Evans Shows Sales Up

PORTLAND, Ore.—Evans Products Company announced that sales and earnings continued at record high levels in the second quarter of 1966, the 18th consecutive quarter in which both sales and earnings improved over those for the same quarter of the preceding year.

For the first half of 1966 net earnings were \$473,000, an increase of 29 percent over the \$370,000 for the first half of 1965. Sales and rentals of \$143,074,000 for the first six months of 1966 represented a 25 percent increase over the \$114,349,000 for the corresponding period in 1965.

Earnings per common share, based on the average number of shares outstanding and after provision for preferred dividends, were \$1.58 in the first half of 1966 as contrasted to \$1.29 in the first half of last year.

In addition to the expansion program now being completed at the company's railcar manufacturing plants in Plymouth, Mich. and Blue Island, Ill., construction of the particle board plant in Silsbee, Texas, additional office and data processing facilities at Plymouth and Portland are proceeding on schedule.

A new panel processing plant will be built for the company's U.S. plant in Chesapeake, Va., adjacent to Norfolk during the second half of this year, as well as a large warehouse at the Plymouth plant in Corona, Calif., and a Marine Terminal facility at Long Beach, Calif. The company has also contracted for the construction of four 25,000-ton bulk carriers in Japan for long-term charter to the company.
