Big Class In Dancing Is Added

The Biggest and Best Fall and Winter recreational program ever offered in the City of Farmington has opened and is expected to attract more participants than ever.

"In other years," John Dinan, City Manager, explained, "we have had fine participation. But this year we are adding several activities to the program and we feel that these attractions are going to be popular."

Among the added activities is square dancing for young, middle-aged and old. Because of the trend toward square dancing in many areas, this square dance program is certain to be attractive.

The entire Fall and Winter program will be of 25 weeks duration with the only break in the schedules being during the Thanksgiving and Christmas recesses.

The square dance classes are to meet at Cloverdale Elementary School from 8 o'clock to 10 o'clock, with the intermediates holding forth on Monday evenings and the beginners on Wednesdays.

"The intent of the intermediate class," according to City Manager Dinan, "is to accommodate those persons with some background in the art of square dancing. And the beginners class is open to all persons, including those with two 'left feet'."

Mr. and Mrs. Harley Wood are in charge of these classes and the cost will be \$1.00 per couple.

The gymnasium segment of the program is free and will be held at Farmington Junior High School during the hours between 8 o'clock and 10 o'clock. The men will meet on Tuesday and the women on Thursday.

A children's program will be offered each Saturday morning from 9 o'clock to 12 o'clock at Cloverdale Elementary School. These classes will be limited to children between the ages of eight and 12 years.

Instructional as well as the open swimming will be held at Clarenceville High School. There is a fee of 40 cents for adults and 25 cents for students. Instructional swimming lessons will cost five dollars for each of the 10-week sessions.
