Construction of sewers to be located in the Township as follows:

Beginning at a point on the line of the Industrial Arm Extension No. 1 distant easterly 550.0 ft. plus or minus along northerly line of section 30, T19N, R9E, Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan. Southerly 420.0 ft. plus or minus proceeds southerly 1250.0 ft. plus or minus to point of intersection with the line easterly and easterly 1975.0 ft. plus or minus to Halstead Road, plus or minus southerly therein 670.0 ft. plus or minus to point of ending said point being northerly 470.0 ft. plus or minus from the east 1/4 corner of said section.
