Freshman Carl Misch, 34201 Conroy Ct, Farmington arrived at Wayne State in time this spring to settle the third-base position on a Tartar baseball team that was hit heavily by graduation all around the infield including third base. That's where the former Farmington High School great stayed for the team's first six games, hitting for .350 pace and making just one misplay in the field. Then, the catching spot was struck by illness for the second time this season and Misch hearkened back to his Little League and Babe Ruth days when he was a catcher and Freshie, his record as a WSU's number one catcher.

BOPHORE regular Mike Stefanac was sidelined after the team's opening twin-bill with infectious mononucleosis. Back-up man Nick Conti, a freshman, inherited the spot and sports a .534 average. But, he is not bedded down a week, this time for a three-day spell with measles.

The Raider trackmen pulled their league record to 2-1 on Thursday, May 5 as they soundly defeated John Glenn by a score of 71-38. It was a beautiful day for some fast times and those times were accomplished, with a record set in the 100 yard dash. The field events did not fare as well. John Glenn swept both the shot put and long jump and took first in the high jump and pole vault. Mike Benjamin took a second in the pole vault with 10 feet 6 inches while Brian Swanson, who previously led in the shot put, took 11 feet 6 inches only managed 10 feet. Rich Mann, who holds the school record at 5 foot 7 inches, bettered his jump by going 3 feet 8 inches and taking second. Falling behind in the field events did not foil the Raiders as they took first in every running event. The 880 yard relay team of Larry August, Bruce Duse, Tom Ware, and Steve Whetter ran for a first with a 2:24. Brian Vlaming swept the 100 and 200 meters. Jim Rowe ran the mile in 4:53, followed by Greg Succop with 5:29. Brian Vlaming ran a 2:11. Steve took the hundred in 10.1 seconds and bettered the school record by 2 of a second. Greg Cleveland had second with 11.4 seconds and Tom Ware third with 10.1 seconds. Bruce Whetter clinched the 400 in 33.8 seconds and Jim Jents took second with 45.9 seconds. Tom Ware, Greg Cleveland, and Joe Lane all swept the 220 respectively. The mile relay team of Craig Wycinsky, Brian Vlaming, Greg Succop, and Jim Jents ran a 3:44 and took the final first place of the meet.

Grid Assoc. Slates Dad's Club Meeting

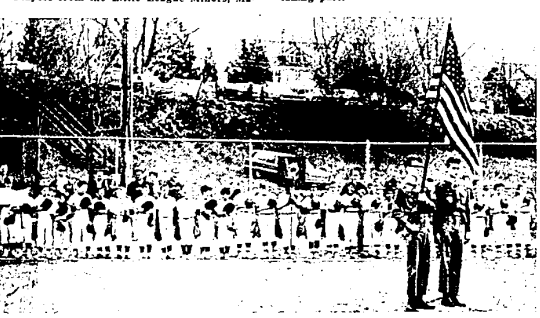

A special meeting of the Council of the City of Farmington was held on May 11, 1966, for the purpose of a Public Hearing on the 1966-67 Proposed Budget. Meeting called to order by Mayor Brotherton. ROLL CALL: Mayor Brotherton, Councilmen Allen, Peterson, Thayer, Yoder present. Absent: None. CITY OFFICIALS PRESENT: City Manager Dinan, Acting Clerk Buck. PUBLIC HEARING 1966-67 PROPOSED BUDGET Mayor Brotherton opened the Public Hearing by requesting that the Notice of Public Hearing be read of the 1966-67 Proposed Budget and asked for comments. COMMENTS Mr. Fred M. Seibert, 2123 Birchwood, questioned the \$4,000.00 expenditure for a Magic Square at Ten Mile Road School inasmuch as it is located so close to the Township. He felt that Township residents would realize more benefit from this facility than City residents. CITY Manager Dinan explained that originally plans were made to build a Magic Square at all elementary schools located in the City and this school is last, having the lowest priority. The elementary school age children derive a tremendous amount of use from the Magic Square and it is located in a neighborhood facility at convenience to citizens. The Magic Squares are used primarily for tennis courts and basketball facilities. Mr. W. A. Nelson, 23708 Warner, stated that this \$4,000.00 all that is allocated for recreational development in capital outlay. He questioned that over 50 percent of existing recreational facilities are located north of Grand River Ave. CITY Manager Dinan stated that the Magic Squares had a separate recreational use from the City Park. Mayor Brotherton stated that it was made a goal to improve the City Park with removal of the well equipped building, etc. for additional space and playground equipment. COMMENTS FROM COUNCILMAN ALLEN Councilman Allen commended the City Manager on the proposed budget. He suggested that some sort of study for disposition of equipment on long range disbursements should be set up.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a meeting of the City Council be and is hereby directed to meet a portion of the budget cost of the City Treasurer be and is hereby directed to assess taxes upon real and personal property in the amount of \$11.50 per thousand of assessed valuation.
