Open House will be held at the Farmington District Library on Sunday, May 22, at 2 p.m. Clifford Meredith and Earl W. DeLaVergne will discuss old and rare books. These local men are specialists in this field.

Meredith became interested in rare books when he came to Detroit as a young man. He spent his lunch hours hauling the Used and Rare Book Stores of Detroit, especially the store of Mr. Higgins on lower Woodward Avenue. Later, he became a bibliophile, but soon found that the joy of selling books was not as great as that of enriching his own collection, and abandoned his store in Detroit. He is active in community affairs and is employed by the local post office.

Earl W. DeLaVergne is a civilian employee of the U.S. Army, living in Farmington Township. He was born in Harbor Springs, Michigan, and is particularly interested in books on the Indians of the area of his birth, all history of the Northwest Territory in general,

which includes early Michigan History up to 1830. DeLaVergne is an active member, and past officer of the Michigan Historical Society.
