

# Summer School Courses Offer Fun and Rewards

Children with the "what-shall-I-do-this-summer" blues will find the elementary summer school enrichment program fun as well as rewarding.

Classes have been scheduled daily at Ten Mile School, 32789 Ten Mile Road, from June 2 to Aug. 5. The classes have been organized into three sessions, making it possible for students to attend any one of two sessions of three weeks length, or an entire six week session with no duplication of experiences. Tuition for the three week sessions, which are scheduled for June 22-July 15 and July 18-Aug. 5, is \$5. The six week session is scheduled for June 22 to Aug. 5 and tuition is \$10. The program is open to non-residents as well as children in the school district.

AMONG THE VARIETY of courses offered are Explorations in Math for grades 4 to 6; Composition and Study Skills, grades 4 to 6; Beginning Spanish, emphasizing conversational approaches, for grades 3 to 6; Intermediate Spanish, grades 3 to 6; conversational vocabulary building, as well as writing and Spanish literature.

Other elementary courses offered are Beginning and Intermediate French for children in grades 3 to 5 with the same grade level emphasis as the Spanish classes; and Science Exploration which will include field studies and projects for grades 4 to 6.

The fundamentals of basketball will be offered grades 4 to 6 at the Farmington High School gym from 8 to 9 a.m. daily. Shooting, passing, pivoting, dribbling and footwork will be emphasized.

Now back to the incorporation. The greatest urgency is for EVERYONE to get out and vote next Monday in order to have a chance of keeping what most of us want. Norm Kreider read the preamble to our original charter drawn up in 1958 when we voted to incorporate as a Village. We wish to preserve our simple, rural way of life. The recap of the returns to the questionnaire sent out indicates that 157 want to remain a Village, only 11 were in incorporation. But, since all of Farmington Township can vote, we must be certain to express ourselves at the ballot box. If we are to maintain our Village, all five members of the Council plus Bill Brown, president of the Civic Association, and Robert Gardon, civic affairs chairman of the Civic Association, were at the head table. After short talks by Bill Brown, Robert Gardon, and Norm Kreider, the meeting was thrown open to a question and answer period. There were no questions. It was also discussed at length. Norm Kreider showed that, since incorporating as a village, we have adopted a zoning ordinance to protect what we want, we have maintained our roads on funds returned to us by the state in a condition enabling us to adjoining communities where roads are maintained by the county, and we are still solvent.

Further stress was placed on the fact that, to maintain this, we must be sure to vote this coming Monday, June 6, at the Highmound School in Holly Hill. Anyone who needs transportation or directions to this new place of voting may call either Berna Trout, MA. 6-9882, or myself at MA. 6-6235. We will be sure to get you there so you can vote.

There will be exactly ten X's for you to make on the ballot. One is for the Yes or No of incorporation. The other 9 are for charter commission candidates. There will be quite a few names on this list. Be sure to vote for no more than 9 or your vote will be thrown out.

Our Norm Kreider and Bill Smolck are two names you will want to vote for. They should be for independent candidates. A further bulletin will be delivered to you within the next day or two and will list the names of the independent candidates plus other pertinent material. These charter commission candidates will meet in office ONLY if a majority in the township vote for incorporation. MOST IMPORTANT. VOTE. VOTE.
