city's Department of Art's permanent collection, maintains his own pottery studio on 10 Mile Rd. The winner of the Tiffany grant for independent study in ceramics, he has studied at Wayne State University and Cranbrook Art Academy. He is currently an instructor at WSU and the Bloomfield Art Association.

Dr. Lam will conduct the Franklin Community Band at its open air concert Thursday night in the Village Green. Because he is scheduled to be out of town over the weekend he will receive his award in a special ceremony Thursday night before the Band Concert.

A native of Farmington, Dr. Bond is a member of an old time Farmington family. The Bond School in the northern end of the school district is named after a member of the same family. A Phi Beta Kappa, he was listed in Who's Who in America at the age of 35. During the summer of 1960, Dr. Bond was one of a team of five American economists who visited Russia for a month's study of the sources of economic growth in the Soviet economy.

Laine, a resident of the community since last December, has been playing golf since the age of 12. He was 16 when he lost his left arm. Neither this nor a stay of several months in a wheel chair during 1935 from arthritis kept him off the links. He was one of the founders of the National Amputees Golf Association which today numbers more than 400 actual players. The current holder of the national title, Laine defended his title in October at Pine Mountain, Ga. under the sponsorship of the Independence Green Golf Course. His score on the Independence Green course is from 61 to 63.

Miles Kristen is currently appearing in the TV "Lost in Space" series. She was a co-star and the only girl in the Walt Disney film "Savage Sam."

A native of Norway, she was adopted by the Soderqvists when she was about four.

Cook won his national title in March, 1965 in Ames, Iowa. He is also a past holder of the Big Ten Championship in the 130 pound class. A graduate of Farmington High School, he is studying Spanish at MSU.

David Shucier, captain of the North Farmington Gymnastics Team, will accept the award for the entire group. The team earned the State Title last spring at the state meets. Two members of the team, Robert J. Kalnz and John Kirk, are state champs on the sidehorse and still rings.

**Ladies Abandon Kitchen For Three Day Festival**

Ladies, in spite of your good intentions, do you still panic a trifle at the thought of company for dinner - especially when you are not just sure how many guests there will be or what time they will arrive?

If so, how would you like a few of these orders? Somewhere between 700 or 800 dozens-and-a-half buns, 1000 chickens and around 10,000 guests? Items like this and problems like how to turn 25 chicken halves at the same time will be the special balldick of the men in charge of the Ox Roast and the Chicken Bar-B-Que during the Farmington Founders Festival.

We made one firm resolution after talking to Don Stewart, Bill Everhart, Dr. John Richardson, and others in charge of the meat at the Festival, and that is absolutely not to set one foot in the kitchen during the Festival.

THERE ARE GOING TO be so many marvelous things to eat so reasonably priced, that we intend to enjoy the whole affair and not be bothered going home to cook.

In fact, so delicious did some of the foods sound that we fairly drooled on the copy.

Ox-Roast is rather a symbolic name, and actually what you are eating is the very choicest roast beef. The Black Angus steers (used in the Ox-Roast) are raised on the Willoughby Farm. They are especially prepared for the occasion.

The Elks (who are traditionally in charge of the roast) have constructed a Bar-B-Que pit right on the Downtown Farmington Center parking lot. A half ton of charcoal is placed in the pit. Wednesday night they will start on the first steer for Thursday's customers.

**Retarded Kids Will Benefit From Festival**

The children at the Plymouth State Home will be one of the many beneficiaries of the Farmington Founders Festival.

Mrs. Faye Sills of 23854 Beacon Dr., Farmington, is again participating in this year's old fashioned sidewalk sale in the Downtown Farmington Center. She will be in her usual spot in the Center selling her own handiwork and a variety of other items. The special goal of Mrs. Sills and her fellow volunteers at the Home is to purchase a special wheel chair which is badly needed for one of the retarded children at the Home.

THERE WILL BE a continuous watch of four men standing six-hour shifts, for the meat must be done just so with the outside crisp and brown, and the inside juicy. Special slicing machines will prepare it for your choice of bun or bread. The Ox Roast is justly famous and nearly 10,000 people are expected to drop by this year. There will be continuous service for the entire time of the Festival.

Don Stewart (in addition to raising a fantastic hand-bar mustache), Bill Everhart and their committee are attending to all the details.

Saturday night will see the Jay-Cee chicken Bar-B-Que and Dr. John Richardson has been busily getting everything in order. There are no cold storage or frozen chickens used, no indeed!

Instead, over 1,000 choice chickens will be freshly killed, packed in ice, and within 24 hours will be roasting over the charcoal pits on specially constructed grids.

THESE CHICKEN halves will be slowly basted with butter during this time and all the Jay-Cees will swing in rhythm as they turn the halves at precisely the same time. Along with this they will serve baked beans, cole slaw, potato chips, etc. Approximately 40 Jay-Cee husbands and their wives will man this project and clean up afterwards.

One word of advice: An early arrival is a good idea. Last year one group dined along the way, arrived rather late at the tennis courts at the park. Standing in line, they were constantly assailed by the delicious odors of roasting chicken. People stopped by to chat with their plates piled high. Then you guessed it, just one person ahead of them, the supply ended.
