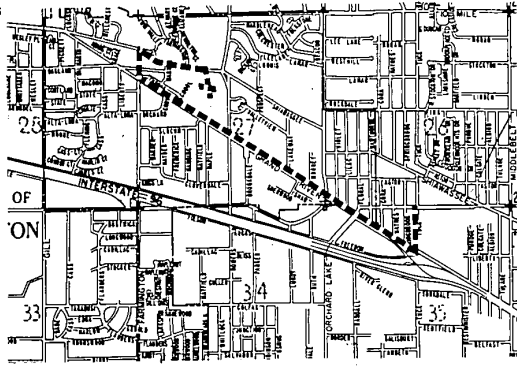

EVERYBODY LOVES A PARADE, and nobody will want to miss the gala Farmington Founders Festival Parade on Saturday, July 30. Beginning at 10 a.m. the parade will start at 9 Mile and Grand River and proceed along the route shown in the above map. "Farmington Honors Its Own" ceremonies will take place at the reviewing stand in the City Park at the conclusion of the parade.

Plan Special Luncheon To Honor Elder Citizens

"Farmington Honors Its Own," theme of this year's Founders Festival, has turned up what Festival officials believe to be a rare circumstance: The first-grade school teacher of one of Farmington's oldest residents is also living in Farmington. Farmingtonites who have received recognition for outstanding achievements in various fields will be honored during the Festival. Meanwhile, all people 60 years of age or more, who have lived in Farmington for 50 years or more, are to be specially honored at a luncheon at the Masonic Temple, Thursday noon, July 28. During the year for these senior members of the community, it was discovered that Stanley Drake, 2801 Drake Road, who has lived all his life on the farm where he was born, not only is eligible for honors in his own right, but also will see his first-grade school teacher, Jenny Zingleman of 21802 Colgate, similarly honored. MRS. ZINGLEMAN was a member of the third class to graduate from Farmington High School. After passing a state examination, she was hired to teach at the Nichols School. In the 1950's it meant boarding with one of the nearby farmers' families. Drake has a vivid memory, testified to by his contributions to the Farmington Historical Society. He is a respected farmer and a Past Master of the Farmington Masonic Lodge; and it all might be due to the guidance he received in the first-grade from Jenny Zingleman, Harley Walters said. Walters, member of the Festival's executive committee, has spent the last several months rounding up Farmington's senior citizens who are eligible (60 years of age or more and a resident of Farmington for 30 years or more) to attend the special honors luncheon. He is concerned that someone may have been missed and asks that anyone who is eligible, and anyone who knows of a person who is eligible, telephone him at 474-5313, or the Board of Commerce, 474-3440.
