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Ten Mile PTA To Continue French, Spanish Classes

Even before regular school classes begin, the Parent-Teacher Association at Ten Mile School is putting together plans for continuation of the Saturday language class program it successfully launched last year.

French and Spanish classes for children in the second through sixth grades will be offered at 9 a.m. and 10 a.m. on ten Saturdays beginning October 1. The course ends December 10, with no class during Thanksgiving vacation. Mrs. Ruth Allaben, PTA Language program chairman, and Ten Mile PTA president Donald McGregor are working on engaging qualified teachers. The cost will be \$8 per pupil for the 10 classes. If there is sufficient interest, there will be intermediate classes for children who began the program last year, as well as classes for beginners.

Last spring more than 100 youngsters were enrolled. LETTERS OUTLINING the class plan will be distributed to all Ten Mile children in the grades involved the first week of school, and principals of other Farmington public and parochial schools will also receive letters. A minimum of 14 students will have to be enrolled in each class by September 16, or it will be cancelled and enrollment checks returned. 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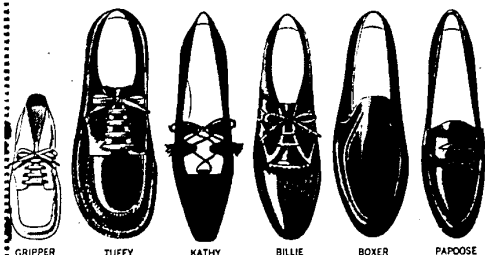
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
