At the present time, the City is adequately servicing 10,000 with tax revenues slightly above \$300,000. If these areas become part of the City of Farmington, we would be servicing 22,000 population with tax revenues of \$1,000,000. The City would then have \$1,000,000 in excess of normal tax revenues available to the City.

The City firmly believes that it will be in a position to increase the level of service and offset future increased cost of operation with the increase in tax revenues.
