lin 976 city — 2,850 township.

For judge of the probate court for the term expiring in 1975, the vote was Eugene A. Moore 1,271 city — 2,350 township; Burton Shifman 697 city — 2,100 township. Voting for Donald Adams for judge of the probate for the term expiring in 1972, was 1,516 in the city, 4,158 in the township.

Tuesday's election was also a clear cut victory for the Republicans in Farmington Township from national through to local offices.

All Township incumbents were returned to their respective posts by a two-to-one majority.

As Supervisor Curtis H. Hall polled 6,857 over Aldo Vagnorzi's 3,744. For treasurer it was "Elise P. Avery 7,073 against Joyce T. Hungerford at 3,551. For trustees it was Arthur S. Bassette at 8,818 and Thomas R. Nolan at 6,879 against Harris Berger at 3,566 and Harold E. Schlepke at 3,411.

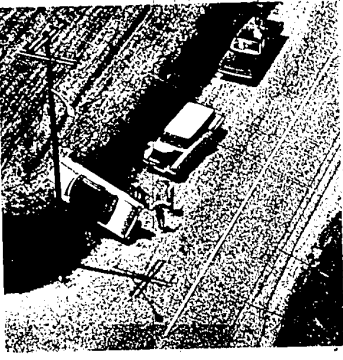
### Woman's Society Schedules Gala Holiday Fair
