## OLM 'Diary' Production Crowning Achievement

Our Lady of Mercy's production of "The Diary of Anne Frank" as the inaugural program in their new auditorium was a crowning achievement.

Miss Beatrice Clayton in the Friday night show did a marvelous job interpreting the spirited Anne. She was smooth, effervescent, and emotionally female.

She was supported by a fine cast of Mercy girls, and boys from Cass Tech, High School, and Farmington Senior High. Senior Steve Shotwell from FHS appeared in his fifth major high school production. This reviewer was impressed, particularly, by the consistency of character interpretation. This is a tribute to the acting ability of the cast.

"Diary" is not the well-made play. It is episodic, to say the least, and there are five scenes in each of two acts.

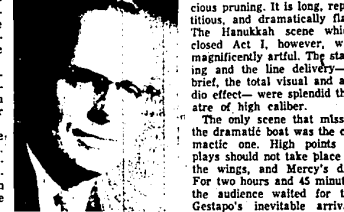
The one and one-half hour first act needed some judicious pruning. It is long, repetitious, and dramatically flat. The Hanukkah scene which closed Act I, however, was magnificently artful. The staging and the line delivery—in brief, the total visual and audio effect—were splendid the state of high caliber.

The only scene that missed the dramatic beat was the climactic one. High points in plays should not take place in the wings, and Mercy's did. For two hours and 45 minutes the audience waited for the Gestapo's inevitable arrival, and when it came, it came with a whimper instead of a roar. Not even the sound effects, which in this instance were faulty, or the alarmed expressions of the performers salvaged what should have been the high moment of the drama.

"Diary" is a play tied to an event that is just short of 25 years into history. And the play is somewhat dated for this generation. It's Vietnam today; War II is ancient history.
