Clarenceville Sports Scene

Clarenceville's Trojan varsity basketball team easily gained their first league victory by romping over Brighton's Bulldogs, 76-65.

With 35 left in the first quarter, Clarenceville had 17 points, and Brighton had yet to get the ball through the basket. The Bulldogs finally netted their first field goal and left the floor at halftime trailing the Trojans by 22 points.

Brighton cut down Clarenceville's lead, but Trojan center Ron Ray's 15 second half points and superb rebounding held off every Brighton surge.

For the second time in three games, four CHS starters scored in double figures. Ray set the pace with 21 points on 10 baskets and 1 free shot, followed by Mark Dilevondorf with 15. Jim Amick and Dave Wilson added 13 each. Chuck Watkins accounted for 6 and Mike Nye had 5.

The Junior varsity scored past Brighton's reserves, 66-63, in a game that ended up a real thriller.

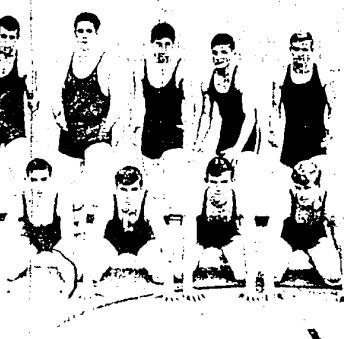

Boat Show Seeks Old Outboards

Antique outdoor motors are sought by the Michigan Boat Show, to be held Jan. 28-Feb. 5 at Detroit Artillery Armory. This ninth annual boat show has "Boating Yesterday and Today" as its theme.

What's an antique outboard motor? One made before 1942, according to Frank E. Burch, show manager. But Burch expects to exhibit outboards in the show that were manufactured in the early 1920's. Also shown will be about 600 new boats and hundreds of new outboard motors.

So anxious is the boat show to locate and exhibit old outboards that the boat show recently announced a contest. It will spill \$1150 in prize money into eight skippers' hands. First prize is \$500, second is \$200, third is \$100. Five honorable mentions of \$50 each will be awarded. The hitch is that the motors must be in operating condition.

Antique outboard motor buffs and boating authorities will judge the entries. Winners will be announced on 28.

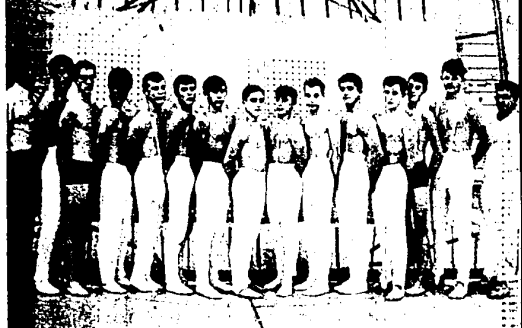
