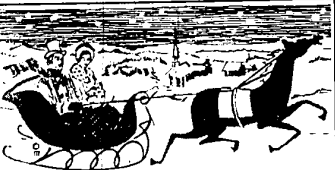


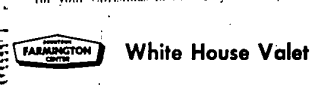

Racing Expert Describes Tips for Winter Driving

"Fifty miles of winter driving is 10 times tougher than 500 miles of fair weather driving," says Mario Andretti, 1965 United States Auto Club driving champion and Indianapolis "500" Rookie of the Year.

Andretti insists that every driver and every car must be conditioned for the rigors of winter driving if the nation's highway traffic safety record is to be improved.

As a top professional driver and chairman of a 100,000 member driving club, sponsored by Montgomery Ward, Andretti is carrying this safety message to drivers of all ages.

For safe winter driving the young racing expert has these pointers:

- Check the tires, battery, cooling, hydraulic and electrical system.
- Tighten all hose connections.
- Use electrical equipment only when the motor is running to conserve battery power.
- Replace worn windshield wiper blades before the first snowfall.
- Never lower tire pressure below the recommended level.
- Replace regular tires with snow tires.
- A box of sand or salt and a shovel should be standard equipment in every trunk.
- Reduce speed when driving on snow or ice.
- If you skid turn in the direction of the spin and take your foot off the gas, the engine will break the speed of the car.
- In racing it takes a combination of driver and pit crew to win the race," Andretti says, "and in winter driving it is a combination of driver and the men of the auto service centers that will win the run for safety."

William Truckner, of Farmington, was among the 66 candidates for degrees at Michigan Technological University's annual fall commencement December 17.
