### **Budget Changes** Improve Schools Financial Outlook

Proposed changes as approved by the Board of Education Monday evening will reduce the gap between expenditures and receipts in the 1968-87 budget to \$22,822. Receipts have been increased by \$155,770 chiefly due to an adjustment in State Equalized Valuation upward to \$140,414,391 over a figure which was originally established at \$139,136,225.

Since the adoption of the budget the following things have occurred to increase anticipated receipts:

Income from investments has increased because of prevailing higher interest rates and because of better fiscal position during the first half of the year. (This is the first year in the past decade that money has not been borrowed to operate prior to current tax collections.) # File Now to Get Tax Exemption

A property tax reduction awaits some senior citizens, widows-of veterans and disabled veterans — if they apply for it. Eligible homeowners have until March 14 to file with City Treasurer Kathryn Cotter or minil March 14 to file with Township Supervisor Curlis Hall.

Last year, 68 city residents received exemptions of up to 5127 each on their property taxes. In the Township, 252 senior citiens received exemptions of up to 5110 each on their billS. VETERANS RECEIVING disability checks, and unremaried widows of yeterans, can receive tax exemptions on up to \$2,000 of state equalized valuation on their homesteads. In terms of tax bills, this meant an exemption of up to \$101 each for 54 City residents and up to \$89 for 175 Township residents.

\$101 each for \$4 City residents and up to \$80 for 175 Township residents. The rule is that the veteran or widow may not own reast each with more than a \$10,000 state equalized valuation in order to receive the exemption.

And it's necessary to fife an affidavit with the City Treasurer or Township supervisor between Dec. 31 and the closing date.
