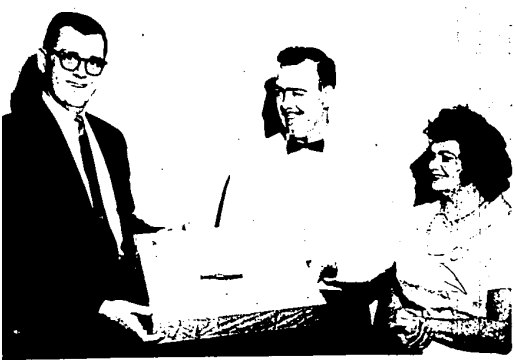

C'ville Lists Classes For Adult Ed. Program

Early registration is encouraged for the Clarenceville Adult Education Program in order to insure a place in limited classes. Anyone sixteen years of age or older and out of school may enroll. Registration deadline is Friday, January 20.

All registrations will take place at the Clarenceville High School office between 7 p.m. and 9 p.m., Monday through Thursday, January 16, 17, 18, and 19.

Fees are to be paid at the time of registration. The fee will be \$9 for a single enrollment and \$15 for a husband and wife to enroll during the same term (it need not be the same class). Exceptions to this are noted with the course description. There is no extra fee for non-residents. No refunds will be given after the second class meeting. A \$1 service fee will be retained from those dropping the course prior to the second meeting.

All classes will meet for twelve weeks from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. at Clarenceville High School, 20155 Middlebelt, unless a otherwise indicated. They will begin on the evening listed during the week of January 23. Additional information in special areas will be given at the first registration.

MONDAY
TYPING I — Emphasis on penmanship, correct posture and fingering and basic letter styles.
ENGLISH I — Designed to teach you basic knitting steps and terms and how to apply them to a garment. Group and individual instruction will be given.

DRIVERS EDUCATION — Learn the basic skills necessary to operate a motor vehicle. This course meets by group arrangement after the first session. The fee is \$30 for 5 hours of behind the wheel instruction. Additional instruction in the car will be offered at \$5 per hour.

PRACTICAL AUTO MECHANICS FOR WOMEN — A unique opportunity to learn the basic methods for solving minor emergency repairs. Study vital car operations and how to properly use for them. An excellent course for the beginning or experienced driver. The class is limited to ten people. It is a week course. The fee is \$7.

TUESDAY
BEGINNING BRIDGE — A study and analysis of the scoring and theory of contract bridge. Learn the Goren point count and elementary playing.

MODERN MATH FOR PARENTS — Learn the fundamental terminology and application of Modern Math. Especially suited for parents whose children are in grades 1 through 8.

OFFICE MACHINES — Learn the operation of various office machines. This course covers the full keyboard adding machine, 10-key adding machine, rotary calculator, key driven calculator, printing calculator and transcriber.

SPANISH I — Introduction to current Spanish; correct pronunciation, practical vocabulary of useful daily and travel expressions; grammar for oral and written Spanish.

WEDNESDAY
BEGINNING AND ADVANCED SEWING — Learn techniques for cutting and fitting a pattern, seams, zippers, and the finer details of sewing.

BOOKKEEPING — Fundamentals of bookkeeping.

THURSDAY
FLOWER ARRANGEMENT — Learn the basic principles of traditional and contemporary flower arrangements with many extra topics included. The class will meet eight 2 1/2 hour sessions. Enrollment is limited to the first 15 registrants.

OIL PAINTING — A course for those who would like to learn to paint in oils or perfect their skills. Composition and design and basic drawing will be emphasized. A ten week, 30 hours class starting at 7 p.m. Fee is \$15. Enrollment is limited to the first sixteen registrants.

CROCHETING I — This course is designed to teach the basic crocheting steps and terms and how to apply them to a pattern. Group and individual instruction.

FRENCH I — Introduction to current French; correct pronunciation; practical vocabulary of useful daily and travel expressions; grammar for oral and written French.

SHORTHAND I — Learn basic principles of Gregg shorthand with a thorough study of the beginning vocabulary, brief forms and phases, dictation and transcription. Skills are developed while the student is training in Theory.

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Open House To Be Held At Beechview

An Open House for grades 2, 3, 4, and art, music, and reading services will precede a discussion of school finances at the January 16 meeting of Beechview P.T.A. The Open House will begin at 7:30 p.m. and parents with children in grades other than 2, 3, 4 are encouraged to visit with their children's art, music, or reading teachers.

Following the short 8 p.m. business meeting, President Arnold Silver will introduce Superintendent of Schools Gerald Harrison as the program speaker on the subject "School Finances." Mr. Harrison, who plans to retire as Superintendent of Schools in June, has 40 years of experience in and dedication to public education both as teacher and administrator. While in the Farmington school system since 1946 and Superintendent of Schools since 1957 he has been prominent in community activities, is a past president of the Exchange Club, has served on the Industrial Development Commission, and is presently a member of the Oakland County Community Mental Health Services Board.

Mr. Harrison will discuss the school tax structure starting from the statutory division of school taxes into separate capital and operating funds and showing the limitations on school programs which have a financial origin. Ample time will be provided for questions and a lively give and take discussion is expected.
