He is married and lives with his wife and four children at 30213 Fiddlers Green.

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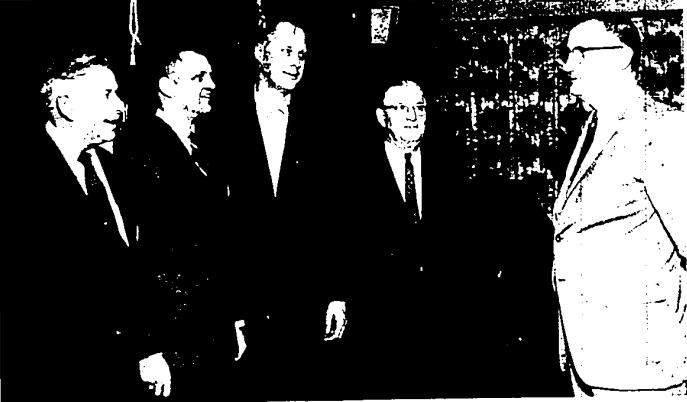

Metro Bank's 12,500 New Shares All Sold

A new issue of Metropolitan National Bank of Farmington stock has been totally subscribed, according to President Louis J. Lavigne.

The 12,500 new shares have been sold at \$22 a share, thus increasing the four year old bank's capital accounts by \$275,000.

The original issue of 25,000 shares in 1963 brought \$20 a share and a total to the capital accounts of \$500,000.

A NEW branch in Quakertown will be opened in March, bank officials said.

The bank's second branch, it will be located at 27500 Farmington Road north of the 1606 expressway. It will represent an investment in land, building and equipment estimated at \$100,000.

The bank's first branch, in Redford Township, was opened in December. The Quakertown branch will be almost identical in appearance.

AT THE Jan. 25 annual meeting, stockholders re-elected all 13 directors. All officers were also re-elected, including Board Chairman Thomas A. Duke and President Lavigne.

Some highlights from the bank's end-of-1966 report:

- Resources at the end of the year were more than \$9.2 million, a 50.8 per cent increase from the \$6.1 million at the end of 1965.
- Loans stood at more than \$4.2 million, a 32.6 per cent increase during the year.
- Demand, savings and time deposits totaled nearly \$8.5 million, a 32.9 per cent increase for the year. Liquidity was more than 54 per cent of deposits.
- Total capital accounts (common stock at par, surplus and undivided profits) stood at the end of the year at \$486,442, an increase of \$22,625 from the end of 1965.

Know Your Michigan Law

(This is a public service article explaining in general terms a provision of Michigan law. Individuals who wish to determine the effect of any law upon their private legal affairs should consult a private attorney.)

Winter is a good time to learn how to operate your boat — and it's also a good time to get to know the legal rules you must follow.

You might have heard about a "hot" lake where the fish really hit hard. Chances are, however, that it is a matter of common knowledge. In fact, so well known that it has become necessary to regulate speed limits, boat size and horsepower, to restrict the use of motorboats, and to establish speed zones and swimming areas.

All of this may interfere with your ideas of an unhibited vacation. Furthermore, the children want to take the boat themselves for a little "zooming" or skiing. So with the versatility of today's boats and trailers, you might want to move to another lake several miles away. You might find that no such regulations exist there.

WHY DO such regulations exist?

The Legislature has declared that the State of Michigan must retain regulatory control over the operation of vessels so that tourist travel and mobility of vessels will not be abridged or interfered with by a multitude of local controls and regulations.

Perhaps because of the activity on the first lake you selected, the local unit of government deemed it necessary and desirable to protect all users of the lake. Perhaps many problems have been encountered with which you are not familiar.

You can be assured that such matters have been well considered by the State Boating Control Committee.

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Bell To Invest \$1.2 Million Here

Michigan Bell Telephone Co. will spend \$1,247,000 in 1967 to expand and improve communications facilities in Farmington.

The local outlay is part of the \$184 million Michigan Bell will spend throughout Michigan during the year. The state-wide sum equals last year's record peak.

Hughes C. Bronaugh, Michigan Bell manager here, said the total expenditure for Farmington would be allotted as follows:

- Outside plant facilities, \$403,000; telephone equipment in homes and offices, \$582,000; central office equipment, \$189,000.

Nine more communities will be tied into the Direct Distance Dialing network in 1967, bringing to 95 per cent the number of Michigan Bell customers able to dial their own long distance calls.

The program of central office modification to accommodate Touch-Tone telephone service will continue in Farmington in 1967 and in several outstate offices.

Part of the huge demand placed on company facilities stems from the fact that more and more customers are requesting better grades of service (one-party versus two-party), and that customers in general are using their telephones more.

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
