Township Acts On 4 New Plats

The Farmington Township Board meeting last week seemed like an extension of the sessions of the Township Planning Commission.

Four plats for new developments were considered by the Board.

Final approval was given to the Churchill Estates development in Sec. 24. This approval, however, is subject to the developer's placing \$1,000 in escrow for the park development and the final approval of detailed plans for the park by the Planners and the Township Board.

THE PRELIMINARY plat for the Camelot Courts Subdivision at 11 Mile and Inkster was approved.

A 10-acre development with 18 lots located on Middlebelt across from East Junior High was approved in the preliminary plat form. This development is named the Country Corners Subdivision.

Preliminary approval of the

James Platt introduced the matter, suggesting that the planners exchange agendas marked with comments before each meeting. The two already exchange minutes.

MOTION by Nolan, supported by Basette, to offer the proposed resolution to request membership in the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments. Motion approved. Mr. Skilman abstaining.

MOTION by Skilman, supported by Basette, to approve said Site Plan of Hunter's Ridge in NW 1/4 of Sec. 3, Q. Orchard Lake and Fourteen Mile Roads, with the stipulation that when in the future, a road is laid out along Fourteen Mile, the Proponent will be required to do so. Motion approved.

MOTION by Cairns, supported by Basette, to change Ordinance No. 30-D to 30-D-10, Authorization No. "N" for Oakland County Water Supply System for Farmington Township Sections C and D-Federal No. P.F.L. - IV. Michigan - 10, is approved and the assessment of liquidated damages be waived. Roll Call, 7 yeas, 0 nays. Motion approved.

MOTION by Cairns, supported by Basette, that the Township Supervisor and the Township Clerk be authorized to enter into an agreement with the historical society handling the matter and what neighboring communities such as Franklin do about it.

MOTION by Oppenheimer, supported by Skilman, that the Township Supervisor and the Township Clerk be authorized to enter into an agreement with the Oakland County Road Commission for the improvement of Power Road and Eleven Mile Road; also Eleven Mile Road between Orchard Lake Road and Power Road. Motion approved unanimously.

Civille Man Wrestling To Affect Many To Coach Of Year

Probably one of the most successful sports at Clarenceville has added another honor to its collection.

Trojan coach Ralph Temby has been selected by the Class B Michigan coaches "Outstanding Coach of the Year" and was presented a trophy.

Four years ago, Temby formed the club.

That same year, the team placed sixth in its first regional competition and won by its members. Don Ylitalo, placed first while senior heavyweight George Keene was second.

This enabled both boys to participate in the state meet.

The next season, the Trojans dropped their first dual meet to North Farmington. Thereafter the team went on to win 24 straight. Their streak was broken by John Clemons, who defeated them by only two points.

But the 1966-67 season was the year for the grapplers. Kaipio and Craig McDougal were not beaten in dual meets while the team as a whole was defeated only once in the regular season. Clarenceville's wrestlers went on to win the Wayne-Oakland League and regular Meet and the Class B Regionals.

JPs are particularly susceptible to this subtle kind of influence because they make their savings from case fees, not salaries.

The reform theory runs: If bill collectors or police have only a District Court, and will be speaking some 13 times a couple of salaried full-time judges to turn to—instead of having a choice of part-timers—the quality of justice will improve.

THE REVENUE picture has caused some public officials to worry.

Under the Traxler bill, fines levied by the District Court would be turned over to the appropriate unit—the city or township where the ordinance were violated.

All fines for violations of the law would be paid to the county treasurer and used for library purposes. This is expected to satisfy local officials.

Justice Byron Walter puts in an average of 24 to 28 hours a week in his court in the township building, where he handles only criminal and traffic cases.

An attorney, Walter holds a job as trust officer for Manufacturers National Bank of Detroit. He says the bank has no objection to his taking time to handle court cases.

Robert H. Nelson, the second JP, keeps his court in his law office in Westbrook Shopping Center on 13 Mile road. He averages nearly one day a week in JP work and earns about \$2,300 from that source.

His secretary puts in an average of nine or 10 hours a week on court work.

NO ONE WILL talk about it on the record, but you don't have to probe far to hear stories from other towns of municipal judges and JPs, mostly the latter—who curvy favor with some persons who appear regularly before them.

Bill collecting firms and real estate agencies are in a position to throw a lot of business to the magistrate who continually gives them favorable decisions.
