Politicians will do many things to get votes and satisfy public whims, and one of the things they do which satisfies an influential group, and which doesn't cost money, is to declare May 1, "Law Day."

Not so. Truth is not the same as law, although they may overlap. A man is guilty when he commits the crime. A trial doesn't decide whether a man is guilty, rather, it decides whether the prosecutor has accumulated enough evidence, under the rules of law, to warrant punishing the accused.

The fact of man's guilt is entirely separate from whether or not he is convicted legally. This is why many truthfully guilty persons are released from prison because of law court decisions.

The old saying should be amended to read: "A man can't be punished until he is proven guilty under such restrictions of evidence and procedure as the law and the men who interpret the law shall deem necessary," or something like that.

# **Vocational**? 'Area' Plan On Ballot

On June 12, Farmington school district voters, along with voters in other Oakland County districts, will decide whether to levy up to a half-mill for an area vocational-technical education pro-

gram.

Here is the first of two articles provided by the Oakland board on what the proposal is about.

What is the "area concept?"

The "Area Concept" in vocational education is based upon the philosophy that all persons who can profit by instruction should have an opportunity to enroll in vocational education programs of their choice. This concept requires that the attendance area be of sufficient size to insure adequate enrollment.

ment.
Such programs are operated so that students retain their identity with their own home high school, acquire their general education, participate in extra curricula activities, and graduote from their home high school. The Area Concept is based upon the philosophy that programs and facilities are available to all residents.

How many students are likely to be served in the area centers?
The facilities that have been contemplated will serve 1,360 full-time students. In the eleventh and twelfth grades there were 26,096 students as of the fourth Friday 1966. On a shared time basis, ten percent of these students could be served in the area vocational centers.

will students be channeled into "dead end" programs? Can students in the area vocational programs earn credit acceptable to college?

The Superintendents Task Force Committee on Curriculum and Program point out, that these programs should not be viewed as terminal. Credit toward college entrance depends upon the program to be pursued in college.

How will students be selected for these centers? Will the students have a cholee of programs?

Counselors at both the home high school and area centers will assist students in their devisions to choose vocational courses. Individual preferences and aptitudes will determine placement.

what types of students will be served in these area centers?
Primarily the eleventh and twelfth grade students of Oakland County who desire vocational education. In addition, the Vocational Education Act of 1983 specifies that there should be opportunity programs, that is programs for students with learning difficulties, vocational programs, and pre-technical programs offered in the centers. There must also be provision for retaining and job upgrading of out-of-school youth and adults.

Will all facilities be of the same size, and have the same offerings?
Facilities will be planned to serve the number and interests of students in the vicinity. Size and programs can be expected to vary accordingly.
What is the average class size?
Class projections have been made on a basis of twenty to 24 students.
How many of these area centers will be constructed in Oakland County and where will they be located?
The recommendations of the Oakland County Vocational Education Committee of 29 are that a center be constructed in each of the four quadrants of the county. What can those centers accomplish beyond what can be done in the existing high schools?

The area centers would provide the variety of courses and sophisticated equipment and facilities necessary for the equitable education of all students in Oakland County.

Is there a danger that these centers will end up as either a program for the lighty talented or a school for discipline problems?
To prevent this from happening a pro-

To prevent this from happening a provision has been structured into the organizational pattern. This consists of two advisory committees; one composed of superintendents and the other composed of representatives of business, industry, and labor.

The committees will make recommendations to the intermediate board of regarding curriculum and,

autons to the intermediate board of education regarding curriculum and) programs.

How do these centers differ from existing high school facilities? Are they a costly duplication?

The centers are complimentary to the programs offered in the local high schools. Programs or facilities that are best handled in the local high school will not be duplicated. Kinds, variety, sophistication and cost of equipment and facilities that are anticipated for the area centers could not be duplicated by individual high school districts.

What happens if we want to offer a vocational program in our own district and the area concept is in effect?

The State Department of Vocational-ducation remains responsible for aiding local schools to implement individual orgrams needed at the constituent level.
