Land situated in the SW4 of Section 1, Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, described as beginning at a point in the center line of Thirteen Mile Road, 403.75 feet West of the South W. corner of Section 1 and running thence 0 degrees 24 minutes 0 seconds West 593.11 feet; thence South 38 degrees 52 minutes 0 seconds West 474.41 feet; thence South 45 degrees 18 minutes 30 seconds West 323.50 feet; thence North 57 45 feet to the point of beginning, containing 2.02 acres more or less, in accordance with Sec. 14, of Act 184 of the Public Acts of 1947 as amended to conform said Ordinance No. 29, in the matter of Chamberlain vs. Township of Farmington, Case No. 2297.
