Vagnozzi

Democratic Supervisor Candidate Aldo Vagnozzi said that last week's personal attack on him and his running mate by Republican Chairman Thomas McMillan explains why the local GOP refused to go along with his proposal for setting up a Farmington fair election practices committee.

"It has become obvious that GOP Township Chairman McMillan did not want a committee of local clergy and other respected community leaders as a watchdog to insure that the Township election campaign is conducted on the issues and not on personal attacks," Vagnozzi said.

Mr. McMillan has apparently been picked to fill the void created by the silent Township Republican candidates. It is interesting

to note that Mr. McMillan was probably chosen because he does not have to answer to the voters or to the other Township Republicans since his job as GOP chairman is an appointive one.

"This leaves him free to take part in the type of attack he launched last week knowing full well that citizens resentful of such an approach cannot vote him out of office," Vagnozzi said.

"Not only did Mr. McMillan's attack deal with issues far removed from the Township election but it also included several inaccuracies, including his conclusion that I should not be elected Supervisor because of the present job I hold."

"It appears that Mr. McMillan has suddenly discovered what most people already know—that I am editor of a state labor newspaper, a job that I am proud to hold."

"In 1980 the people determined that a man's religion should not be a bar to holding public office. In 1987 the voters decided that the geographic area from which a candidate came should not prohibit him from being elected to office. I hope that in 1988 Mr. McMillan is not suggesting that a man's job should automatically disqualify a person from trying for public office."

Join City Tax Force

Farmington's City Assessor Walter T. Keating must be a hard man to follow.

Keating, who joined the City staff on a part time basis six years ago has retired and Monday night the City Council agreed to go along with City Manager John Dinan's recommendation and appoint not one but two men to fill his shoes.

Named City Assessor was George Clement, 62, who has just retired from the City of Detroit's Assessing Office. The Deputy Assessor will be William Brinkman, 31, who is also retiring from the Detroit staff.

Clement is experienced in the assessment of building construction, while Brinkman has been the head appraiser for land assessments for several years. With this in mind Dinan said that the two would balance each other and the City would have two experts on hand.

Both men, Dinan explained, were taking the position in order to keep active. With this in mind and the fact of not wishing to jeopardize their social security payments the men had agreed to work for \$124.50 per month, plus a \$65 car allowance.

Tickets Go On Sale

Plans for the third annual Old Yule Log Football game between Farmington High and North Farmington on Saturday, Nov. 12 are well underway.

Kickoff time is 2 p.m. in the North Farmington Stadium. The Farmington Falcons will seek to even up the series this year as last year's contest was won by the North Farmington Raiders. The first event in the series ended in a scoreless tie.

The Old Yule Log game is sponsored annually by the Greater Farmington Board of Commerce in cooperation with the Board of Education and the Athletic Department of the Farmington Schools.

Proceeds are divided between the school athletic fund and the Board of Commerce Christmas Lighting Fund. Last year more than \$500 was added to the fund for holiday decorations in the community.

This Resolution would permit that portion of Highway 1896 which lies in the City of Southfield, between Telegraph and Eight Mile Roads, to be designated the 'Adler Memorial Highway' as a memorial to the late Rabbi Morris Adler of Southfield.

The Resolution was adopted unanimously by the members in the House and Senate during this session.
