

## Famed Local Writer Passes Away In Mexico

Mrs. Gladys B. Cutler, a former resident of Plymouth and noted contributor of light verse and humorous essays to publications throughout the United States and Mexico, passed away in Mexico, after an illness of several months.

The wife of E. Malcolm Cutler, who resided at 193 North Main Street, until transferred to Mexico City by the Ford Motor Company

two years ago, she was the author of a volume of poems entitled "So Many Things."

Her writings gained national prominence for her and in 1962 she was named "Writer of the Year."

Aside from her writings, Mrs. Cutler, along with her husband, was an avid bird watcher and they logged thousands of miles in Mexico to add to more than 500 species they had identified.

During her two year residence in Mexico she contributed to Mexican Life, the News Sunday magazine, American Society Bulletin. She was a member of the Detroit Writers Club and the Detroit Audubon Society.

Funeral services were held on Monday afternoon at the Scholander Funeral Home and interment was in Riverside Cemetery.

## Corner Zoning Scrutinized By Planners

The City of Farmington's Planning Commission has instructed Planning Consultant Robert Diebold to review the zoning at the corner of Halstead and Grand River for his recommendation on possible rezoning.

This action was taken Nov. 14 following the City's successful annexation attempt of the 47-acre parcel and the defeat of the larger parcel of land with additional area for industrial and commercial zoning.

In making the recommendation the Commission pointed out that the City Council had gone on record as to being opposed to the rezoning of the residential property adjacent to the Woodcroft Subdivision east of Dodge Rd. and south of Grand River from its present residential classification to a multiple classification.

The Commission also stated that it was in agreement with the City Council on closing off Oaklawn Ave. at Longview when the area officially becomes a part of the city.

City Manager John Dinan was also instructed to investigate the possibility of a grant for land acquisition from the Department of Conservation and Water Resources since this would amount to about 75 per cent assistance rather than the 50 per cent under the federal program.

The City has not filed its petition for a federal grant because under the proposed annexation program a 10-acre parcel eligible for a grant to the Longacre Elementary School is this land which could bring the grant of up to 75 per cent of the funds necessary for acquisition.
