Buback Case Returns For Removal Hearing

The hearing to consider the removal of Wayne County Sheriff Peter L. Buback from office will proceed as originally scheduled.

The District Court of Appeals ruled in effect, that it would not delay the removal from office hearings scheduled before Macomb County Probate Judge Francis A. Castellucci.

Buback argued before the Court of Appeals that the

removal hearing would prejudice the Circuit Court trial to be held on charges that the sheriff and Undersheriff James L. Bommarito are guilty of willful neglect of duty.

These charges, which had a lengthy preliminary examination in the Grosse Pointe Municipal Court of Judge Douglas Paterson, grew out of the Nankin Township traffic ticket fiasco, which triggered the Piggins Grand Jury.

Hospital Expansion Assured

The progress on the \$18 million bond issue to finance an expansion program was assured last week with a new warning that additional delays could continue to boost the final construction price to a level higher than planned.

The bond issue, for which bids were opened Monday night by a special meeting of the People's Community Hospital Authority, passed by the minimum two-thirds vote last month but a Dearborn Heights member of the board of directors had his "yes" vote switched to a "no" vote but he was refused by the board's chairman.

He threatened to start legal action to change his vote, which would have meant the lack of approval for the bond issue, but last week he withdrew his opposition.

The director, Mitchell Skazalski, said that "there is no useful purpose being served" in pursuing his point. "To further delay approval of the bond issue would only render a disservice to the people of the PCA, which includes Garden City and Westland."

In a letter on the same topic, executive director of the authority, Dr. Earl S. Kiehl, said 43-member board of directors that in the past month, building costs on the expansion to build a new 170-bed hospital in Ypsilanti to replace the 144 Beyer Memorial Hospital and to construct a 149-bed addition to the Spawny Hospital in Trenton, have risen about one percent of the originally estimated cost of \$11,246,000.

In the court of Judge Castellucci and in the Court of Appeals, Buback said that if he could not receive a fair trial in Circuit Court.

"But Castellucci replied that there is a possibility that after the hearing in his court, Buback would be allowed to remain in office, thereby prejudging the future Circuit Court trial on the opposite extreme."

Castellucci ordered the removal hearing to start Oct. 24 but it was postponed pending the Court of Appeals hearing.

No new dates have been set yet for either the Circuit Court trial or removal hearing.

MSU Head Says Colleges Must Expand

EAST LANSING — President John A. Hannah of Michigan State University says that pressures on colleges and universities are "intense and so persistent" that educational innovation is mandatory.

Rather than turn away from their colleges and universities, President Hannah noted, Americans are "far more likely to continue to look increasingly to their universities for trained people, improved services and intensified research."

"The demands for multiple services are more likely to continue to expand," he added.

He made his remarks in a speech at a national conference on educational innovation for large colleges and universities, held recently at MSU.

President Hannah said that the "real test of our mettle as educators and administrators" is to insure that "our universities . . . can reflect the spirit of the times . . . without yielding to the point of deconstruction."

President Hannah said the commitment to innovation must be shared by administrators, governing bodies, faculty and students. Financial support for innovation must come not only from the universities themselves, he said, but "hopefully from governmental and private foundation sources."

In a recent letter to his parents, the seaman said that the "fire was really bad" but would give more details when he returned home.

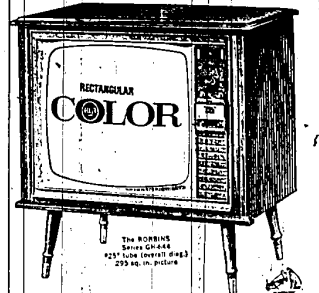
