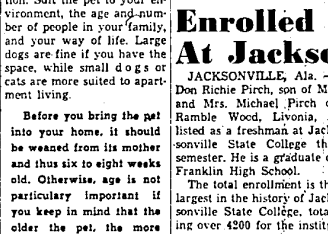

## Tips on Pets For Christmas

With Christmas fast approaching, many families are considering a pet as the ideal gift. Whether it be a frisky puppy or furry kitten, there is a pet to fit any taste.

According to the Oakland County Veterinary Medical Association, common sense rather than sentiment should prevail in making your selection. Suit the pet to your environment, the age and number of people in your family, and your way of life. Large dogs are fine if you have the space, while small dogs or cats are more suited to apartment living.



Before you bring the pet into your home, it should be weaned from its mother and thus six to eight weeks old. Otherwise, age is not particularly important if you keep in mind that the older the pet, the more difficult it is for it to transfer loyalty from one person to another. Choose a healthy pet by careful selection, but to make sure your final choice is "in the pink" have it examined by a veterinarian.

To housebreak a dog completely may take a minimum of a few weeks and possibly a routine and following it no matter what the personal inconvenience, is vital to accomplishing your aim.

"Paper Training" is one of the popular methods of housebreaking a puppy. Keep the puppy confined at first on a thick layer of newspaper. His own instincts will compel him to use this area and return to it. Gradually remove most of the papers so that the idea of using only particular becomes rooted in the dog. When replacing soiled papers with clean ones, always leave a scrap of paper, to serve as a scent to guide him. Take your puppy outdoors at frequent intervals and, if you wish, carry some of the soiled paper with you to help the dog know what is expected of him. Praise and pet him when he does what is expected of him. Housebreaking a cat is relatively easy. Provide him with a litter box and put him in it at regular intervals.

## Road Deaths Show Hike In November

Michigan traffic deaths numbered 188 in November, 80 or 11 percent more than 68 in the same month a year ago, according to State Police provincial records.

The November number deaths brought the year's accumulated toll to 2029, which was 146 or 7.7 per cent higher than 1,883 in the same period in 1965.

The 11-month total is just 100 below the count of 42,129 for all of last year which was the third worst annual toll in state history. The two higher losses were 2,175 in 1937 and 2,133 in 1941. If December deaths approach the month's average of 178 of the last five years, Michigan will reach a new high this year in traffic fatalities.

The November count was 76 greater than the average for the month in the five years of 1961-65. High November toll was 219 in 1941, low was 87 in the following year.

Compared with the corresponding months in 1965, there have been six months showing increases in deaths this year, five with reductions.

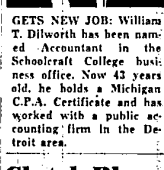
