Y Instructor Creates New Yule Decorations

Decorating your own home for the Christmas season is one of the truly pleasant tasks of these busy days.

Creating your individual designs makes it even more fun.

And showing other women how to work out these lovely Christmas effects is the best of all, thinks Mrs. Irene MacKinnon, 2566 Ridgewood, in Farmington.

For the past four years, Mrs. MacKinnon has been teaching at the YMCA Farmington branch, specializing in sewing classes and all manner of fancy needlework.

Her Christmas decoration classes, which definitely do NOT stress fancy needlework, grow more popular each year.

"I thoroughly enjoy my teaching work," says Mrs. MacKinnon, who also has had considerable experience in fashion coordinating and commentary.

"It's wonderful to pass along some of the ideas I've worked out, and to show women that they need not be experienced seamstresses or artists to rate beautiful effects."

Perhaps the favorite Christmas decoration for this year's classes — Mrs. MacKinnon also teaches in Dearborn — is a striking Christmas tree made of 171 ordinary bottle caps, plywood or cardboard, and 171 tiny Christmas ornaments and a string of Italian lights.

Aside from having an extensive background in the field of oriental music, Mrs. Malm is the author of several books on the subject and has written for many scholarly publications.

Members and guests attending the meeting also will be able to see the original Christmas decorations made by the Consumers Power Co. staff.

BOTTLE CAP TREE
Make a plywood or cardboard base in an equilateral triangle with each side measuring 23½ inches. Lay out a four inch square extending from the center of one side for the trunk. Boil 171 bottle caps a few minutes to loosen the corks, then remove corks and wash and dry caps carefully. Glue flat side down to the base, starting with 18 caps in the longest row; let the caps extend a little over the side for a scalloped effect.

Spray the tree Christmas green, and glue 1½ inch ornaments in the center of each cap, using a clear glue, and first removing the ornament's hangers. Trim the tree trunk with bark and run a string of lights along the outer edge.

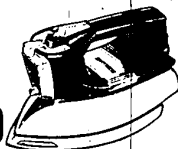
