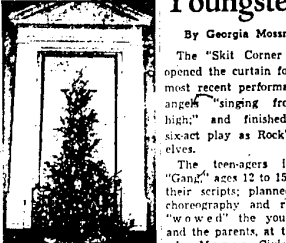


Chrismon Tree

Egg Nog Reigns In A Regal Mold



When a woman gets a yen to experiment with food, there's a world of types, amounts and national varieties to draw upon. These Creamy Egg Nog Pudding Molds from the Borden Kitchen spring from just such a creative combination—a light Bavarian base plus the modern convenience of canned egg nog and the fruit of the season. Not only are such molds quick to make, they're regal—designed to reign as a finale at a light luncheon, with cookies for an afternoon gathering, or as a dessert at dinner. Creamy Egg Nog Pudding Molds (Makes six 3-ounce servings): 1 envelope (1 tablespoon) plain unflavored gelatin, 1/4 cup water, 1-1/4 cups Borden's Canned Egg Nog, 2 tablespoons rum, or rum extract, 1/4 cup heavy cream, whipped, 1 (10-oz.) package frozen strawberry halves, defrosted OR 1 cup fresh, sweetened strawberries. In the top of a double boiler, combine gelatin and water; let stand 5 minutes. Dissolve softened gelatin over hot water; cool. In a medium-size mixing bowl, combine egg nog, nutmeg, rum and gelatin; blend well. Chill mixture over ice water until slightly thickened; stir constantly. Fold in whipped cream. Return to ice water. Chill until mixture again starts to thicken slightly; stir occasionally. Pour into lightly oiled 3-ounce molds. Refrigerate until firm—about 2 hours. At serving time, turn pudding out of molds. Garnish with strawberry sauce or berry slices.

Is Stocking Just Legend?

Did a splinter hang up the first Christmas stocking? Legend says yes, but history says no—or at most, "Maybe." St. Nicholas, a fourth-century bishop, secretly gave gifts of gold for the dowries of poor spinsters. His mother-in-law, to lose the gold down a chimney by night, at Christmas. On one occasion, so legend says, the gift landed in a stocking, hung by the fireplace to dry. History casts a dubious eye on this "origin" of the Christmas stocking custom. The spinster probably didn't have a stocking—not in the fourth century. Knitted, form-fitting hosiery was unknown until the thirteenth century. Earlier, people wrapped cloth or rags around their feet as substitute for modern stockings. Even after William Lee invented the stocking frame, a more efficient method of production, in the late 1500's, it was some time before the poor could afford to buy stockings. History makes one concession to the legend tellers. Paintings from Pompeii show that early Romans did wear some form of stockings, even before the birth of Christ.
