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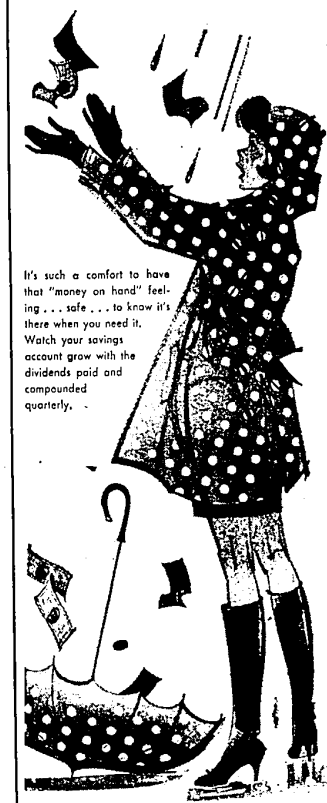

# City Takes First Step

The Farmington City Council moved a step closer to provide sewer and water facilities to the residents of the Woodcraft Subdivision Monday night when it conducted a public hearing on the necessity of such facilities.

City Manager John Dinan explained to the group that two public hearings had to be conducted under the procedure. He noted that all the legal steps should be completed in four to six weeks and construction could begin soon after that if the City did not run into legal problems.

In this he was referring to the court case, which the Township has filed against the City seeking a proportionate share of the tapin fees to pay for the Tarabusi Industrial Arm debt.

Dinan noted that the pretrial hearing that had been set for last Friday had been postponed for another three weeks.

The City Council has scheduled the second hearing in the matter on the special assessment district for its next session April 10.

# Schools Seek Two Easements

One principle of neighborhood planning is to avoid "through" streets that might attract heavy traffic volumes. But that kind of planning can lead to complications for school planners — as the Farmington Board of Education learned last week.

Faced by plat plans for a subdivision and an apartment project, the school board decided to attempt to get easements for possible sidewalks for school children.

First, the board asked township officials to get a six-foot easement in Country Corners Subdivision in Section 23, south of 11 Mile and west of Middlebelt.

Because Gramercy Court, on which the subdivision's 18 lots are located, will come to a dead-end, the school board asked for an easement at the west end of the street. The easement would lead to the central part of Section 23. No elementary school is there now, or is planned in the immediate future, but Sup't. G. V. H. Harrison suggested the board take the precaution.

Second, the school board asked its site committee to investigate the possibility of an easement north from an apartment project north of 12 Mile between Orchard Lake and Farmington Roads. The contemplated easement would extend to Red Clover Drive in Kendallwood Subdivision.

budget for the local roads in the Township is \$30,000. This figure must pay for the work done on a majority of the Township streets. Local roads include all of the subdivision streets and the minor or less used mile roads.

Roads such as 12 Mile, 10 Mile, Middlebelt, Orchard Lake and Grand River are not included as they are termed major roads.

Until a month ago all the Road Commission equipment was housed in Pontiac. A new garage has just opened at Franklin Rd. and Northwood Highway and in the future Farmington Township will be serviced by men and equipment stationed at this building.

Farmington Township Supervisor Curt Hall says that the Oakland County Road Commission has "the desire and the know how" to maintain the Township roads. "They have everything but the money," he asserts.

Hall said that the money is allocated by a formula de-

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termined by the State Legislature and the Road Commission must follow this formula. With the funds allocated, the road commission must take care of snow removal, grading and maintaining the culverts.

"In 1969," Hall recalled, "a one mill request for a period of five years to provide for roadside drainage and improvement was placed on the ballot in Farmington Township. If it had been passed then, the situation would have been corrected to some extent."

In the City of Farmington the Alta Loma Home Owners Association wrote to the City Council complaining about the condition of their roads.

City Manager John Dinan said that the condition of the roads is due to a two-fold reason: lack of proper drainage and lack of budget to withstand the frost heave during the winter.

"The only repair work that the City can do is one of patching and grading, but it will not be a permanent solution to the conditions in the Alta Loma Subdivisions until drainage and a new base is installed," Dinan noted.

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
