Livonia Chevy Gets Into Act

Chevrolet's spring and bumper plant in Livonia will play an important part in the production of General Motors 100 millionth car, according to Plant Manager Harrison T. Price.

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When the car is produced, Price said, it will include several parts made in the Livonia facility and shipped to Janesville for final assembly. He said these include front and rear springs, rear bumper brackets and center, fender, rear axle upper control arm bracket assembly and control arms.

Following official Janesville ceremonies marking the milestone event, the Nantucket Blue Caprice will be shipped to Detroit for display in the General Motors Building.

Free John Ott of Murder Charge

John Lee Ott, 23, of 22570 Tulane, Farmington Township, was acquitted of the charge of second degree murder Friday in the Oakland County Circuit Court.

The jury deliberated five hours before reaching the decision. The trial had lasted for five days and defense counsel Ian Barris of Detroit argued that Ott acted in self-defense.

Ott was reported to have shot Donald Garren, 22, of 2756 Woodington, Farmington Township on July 10, 1966. The shooting occurred about 1 a.m. during an argument over \$50 which Garren owed Ott.

Garren was reported to have fired first during the argument.

Lawrence Tech Is Accepted By NCA

Lawrence Institute of Technology has been accepted for membership in and accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, one of the six regional accrediting agencies in the country.
