Building, 828 Penniman, the City Commission took steps Monday evening to acquire it, raise it and use it for a parking area.

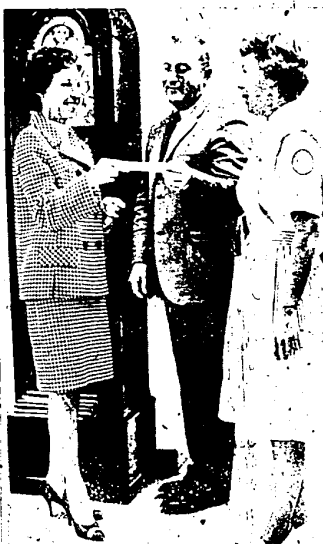
"This has been an eyesore for a long time," Commissioner Arch Vallier stated, "it is about time that something was done."

As a result, the Commission instructed City Manager Richard Blodgett to take the necessary steps toward acquiring the building and the cost of having it razed for the construction of a parking lot. According to Commissioner Vallier the area could accommodate two rows of cars and would bring relief to the central parking lot.

Madonna Students Get Help

Students at Madonna College will benefit from an increase in federal and state tuition grants next year.

The college recently was awarded a \$15,500 Educational Opportunity Grant by the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare for the scholastic year 1967-68. Sister M. Danatha, president, announced.

The grant provides funds for higher education to full-time undergraduate students who show evidence of academic or creative promise and capability of maintaining good standing in their courses of study.

Students must also be of exceptional financial need—those who for lack of financial means of their own or of their families would be unable to enter or remain in college without the grant.

The EOG is geared to a maximum grant of \$800 per academic year for students whose parents cannot make any contribution toward their support to the minimum of \$200 for those whose parents can contribute as much as \$578-\$695.

The college determines and selects the students eligible for the grant. The grants are awarded under Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965.

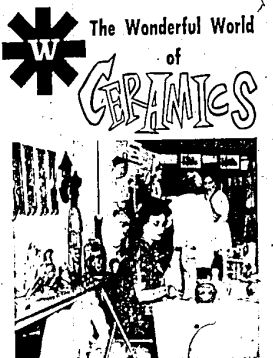

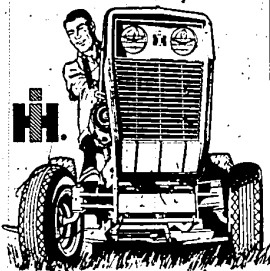

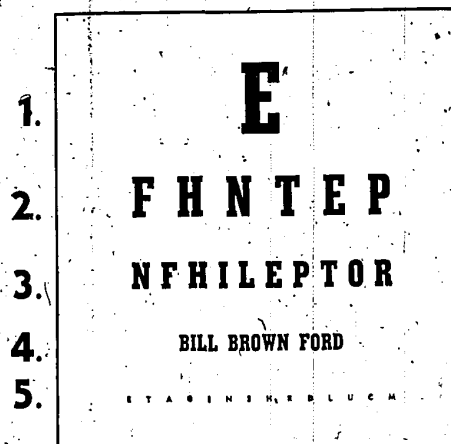
