

Fails in Attempt to Outrun PD

The Oakland County prosecutor's office has issued a warrant at the request of Farmington city police charging a Pontiac driver with fleeing arrest and with reckless driving.

Farmington police arrested George W. Hill, 18, of 4916 Lakewood, Pontiac, after he was pursued by a city scout car for reckless driving and attempted to avoid arrest early in the morning on Memorial Day. Hill is free on \$100 bond.

According to police, Hill was driving south on Grand River at 3:30 a.m. Tuesday when he allegedly made an illegal turn onto Orchard Lake Rd.

He was then chased by police north along Orchard Lake, swerving and fishtailing through a red light at 10 Mile Rd., then accelerating to 85 mph as he approached I-696 north of 11 Mile Rd., police said. He was stopped at a Farmington Township police barricade at the expressway entrance.

school, and have facilities to make available to the community college and for adult education programs scheduled outside of school hours.

The community college would help to extend occupational education and training provided by the local school and the area center by offering courses and programs coordinated to provide more extensive and specialized training.

Baumgardner described the area concept as "based upon the philosophy that all persons should have an equal opportunity to enroll in specialized, broad choice vocational education programs regardless of where they live."

"The area center, it is noted, 'serves as an extension of the department of vocational education for each participating high school. Specialized occupational preparation programs, such as data processing, electronics, health occupations and various skilled trades can be offered through such a center.'"

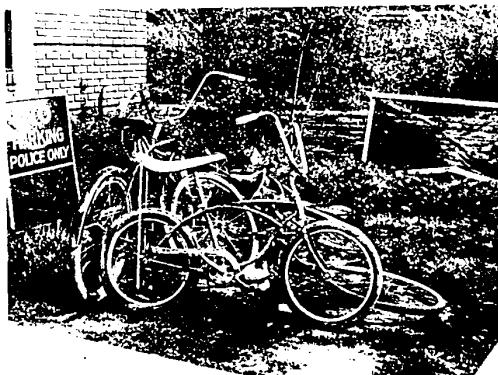
