Church Founders Looked Ahead

Far-sighted might be the work for founders of St. Paul's Lutheran Church on Light Mile and Middlebelt.

After sharing a church with Salem United Church of Christ near old Clarenceville Cemetery from 1875 to 1892, early members of the church bought the present property which today, with the addition of another piece, is worth \$450,000.

This value includes the worth of church, school and parish hall.

THE SCHOOL enrolls 152 children in kindergarten through the 8th grade with John Walther doubling as principal, church organist and choir director.

St. Paul's pastor, the Rev. W. F. Rutkowski, says he is "something of a superintendent." He has had good training for his dual role of superintendent and clergyman.

For over 35 years he taught eight grades of 35 children in a one-room school at his home parish of Auburn, Mich. Considering today's school specialization, the pastor shrugs this feat off without little pride.

He himself went to a one-room school in Auburn and for a year had his father, the Rev. Fred Rutkowski, as a teacher. About this, the Farmington pastor says, "He made me memorize twice as much. And I studied German for seven years. My father said I needed it, so I studied it."

"My own children tell me that they're sorry they didn't listen to me before they took college German."

"ONE-ROOM schools," the pastor continues, "are set up so that you learn from the older children. Anyway, we all learned to read and write and there was a lot of singing."

The pastor's experience with young people stands him in good stead with his youthful

congregation. The median age of his parishioners is age 19.

According to Mr. Rutkowski, what gives him the most trouble is remembering the 600 names of the baptized children who are in the congregation.

Pastor Rutkowski has been at St. Paul's since Nov. 1943. He attended Conception College at Fort Wayne, Ind., and completed Theological Seminary, St. Louis, Mo. Before St. Paul's he served churches in Inletville and Okemville, Mich., for 13 years, going through ordination at one four hours after he was ordained at the other.

As the product of a parochial education himself, the pastor is a strong supporter of it.

"We try to give our children a good Christian foundation in their youth. One hour of religion is taught every Sunday, and the Christian viewpoint is brought on throughout the day."

"OF COURSE" apply Luther's principles of the 1500's to today, but Christian doctrines still apply. I mean that something like the Christian principles of marriage and the home still hold true. It's this that we try to train into our children while they're still young and pliable."

"But we always try to supplement the training in the home. When we don't get parental cooperation, we call in the parents, just as the public schools do, maybe faster."

Pastor Rutkowski admits that life today is very different than it was in the 1500's when the church was the center of the community.

"Life is highly competitive today," he says. "People are so over-burdened with so many projects they don't have time for the church."

"But if something jars them, sickness, a death, problems at work—they still know where to look for God's word."

"Man hasn't changed a bit, the times have but man still needs God's word."
