

Voters to Quiz Candidates for School Boards

The Livonia League of Women Voters will sponsor a "Meet Your Candidates" night in Steven High School auditorium Thursday at 8 p.m.

Candidates for the Livonia and Clarenceville School Boards have been invited to the meeting, which is open to the public.

Also invited are candidates for trustee-at-large, Schoolcraft Community College and the trustee-at-large from Clarenceville district for the community college.

Mrs. James Callow, LWV Voter Service chairman, will be moderator for the program.

Candidates for the school board from both districts will be asked the questions:

"In view of our rising school population, how do you propose to meet the financial challenge—property taxes, federal or state aid, other methods?" and:

"What special qualifications or experience will you bring to the school board?"

Trustee candidates for Schoolcraft Community College will be asked the following questions: "How do you envision the future role of Schoolcraft College in the Community?" and, "What special qualifications or experience will you bring to the college?"

There will be an opportunity for the audience to ask the candidates questions.

The candidates for the four-year term in Livonia are Edwin S. Brown, William

H. Craft, James W. Freed, George L. Kindred, Kenneth J. Morris, Robert J. Siegmund and Joseph A. Milko.

In the Clarenceville District Samuel Prisk, Thomas C. Wilson, and Vern Foster are candidates for the four-year term.

To fill Clarenceville's 3-year term are candidates E. Fred Turner, Harold Weiss, Robert M. Erickson, Donald A. Hayden, Edward P. May and Douglas McArthur.

Leroy C. Bennett and George E. Martin are candidates for trustee at-large for Schoolcraft Community College.

Paul Mutnick is the only candidate from the Clarenceville District for Schoolcraft Community College.

Open to the public, the "Meet Your Candidate" programs are offered as a non-partisan service to the community and are held prior to most important elections.

School Voters Can Get Absentee Ballots

Mrs. Willa Parmenter, elections secretary for the Livonia Board of Education, reminded voters in the 39 square mile area in Livonia and Westland that absentee voters ballots for the June 12 election can be obtained or voted at the Board building, 15125 Farmington Road, south of Five Mile, until 2:00 p.m. on Saturday, June 10.

According to school board secretary, Dr. A. Edward Katz, 59 polling places will be open on Monday, June 12th from 7:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m. Of these 41 are in Livonia and five in Westland.

The following persons have been nominated to fill two vacancies. Running are in-

Polling places for board elections are all located in public schools.

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State Road Toll Shows Dip in May

Michigan traffic deaths in May numbered 172, which was 35 or 17 per cent below the all-time record of 207 for that month set last year, according to State Police provisional figures.

The month's deaths were 13 higher than the May average of 159 for the five years of 1982-86.

About a fourth of the May deaths resulted from accidents in the four-day Memorial holiday period, when 37 were killed. This was six fewer than 43 deaths in the three-day holiday period in 1986.

The May fatalities bring the accumulated total for the first five months to 698 which was 140 or 17 per cent below 839 for the same period last year.

Delayed death reports will increase slightly the provisional May and accumulated totals.

Back at Scene, Jail Dropout

A Franklin High School dropout recently spent a day in the Livonia jail after pleading guilty to loitering and indecent language on school property.

Dennis Ryan, 17, of 9744 Farmington Road, Livonia, was seen four times on school property after quitting school May 16. A school supervisor reported that Ryan became belligerent and used profanity when asked to leave the parking lot on May 22.

An administrator reported that when he observed Ryan in the hallway May 23 and told him he should not be there, Ryan replied, "I know."

Municipal Judge James R. McCann ordered the day in lieu of a \$25 fine.

Moelke Issues Tornado Caution

Mayor Harvey W. Moelke got around this week to mentioning something that no one likes to think about, but which is necessary, each sultry season, for some one to talk about.

It was some words to his people about—tornadoes.

The mayor, speaking to Livonia's 103,000 residents, reminds that tornadoes can occur anywhere and at any time. And like everyone, he hopes that this will be a season without "nature's violence," but that if it hits, Livonians will not be in its destructive path.

Residents, the mayor said, can minimize the effects of the violent winds if they will simply follow simple rules — put out by the Environmental Science Services Administration of the Department of Commerce.

The ESSA, through the U.S. Weather Bureau, keeps constant watch on the nation's weather.

When conditions are such that tornado generation is possible, ESSA issues a "tornado watch." That's the first alert for a specified area to be on the look-out for tornadoes. When one is actually observed or indicated by radar, a "warning" is issued. This

means "take emergency precautions immediately."

But ESSA says go on about your work after a "watch" but keep an eye on the weather outside, and keep an ear near radio or television set to hear further information about "warnings" — if any — for your area. With the "warning," seek shelter inside, preferably in cellar or other underground excavation, or steel-framed or concrete building. Stay away from windows.

If in an office building, stand in an interior hallway on a lower floor, or basement. Factory workers should move to a section offering greatest protection.

In homes, if there is no basement, seek shelter under heavy furniture in the center of the house. Keep some windows open. Do not stay in house trailers.

In schools, go to an interior hallway or basement shelter, avoid auditoriums, gymnasiums, and other structures with wide, free-span roofs.

There's the suggestion, too, that "If you see a tornado, and there is time, report it to the local weather bureau, or to the police."

Candidates on Ballot

Clarenceville Votes Monday

Clarenceville School District voters will ballot Monday on representatives to the Schoolcraft Board, of Trustees as well as for members of their own Board of Education.

Paul Mutnick, 19822 Weyher, Livonia, is unopposed in his bid for re-election to the six-year term as stake.

However, in the contest to elect a representative-at-large, there is a two-man contest between the incumbent, Leroy C. Bennett, 18809 Nola Drive, Livonia, and George E. Martin, 16563,

Ronnie Lane, Livonia. The voting area includes five separate school districts, and the candidate receiving the most votes from the total sector will be declared winner.

It is the position of The Observer Newspaper Group that the incumbent, Bennett, is best qualified and deserves re-election.

Another vacancy on the

Schoolcraft Board, caused by the retirement of Dr. Gordon Farrer, also is to be filled but that selection is strictly up to City of Northville residents.

Paul Hunt, Bertram Seccord and Edgund Yerkes, all of Northville, are the rivals for the vacated Foster seat which serves exclusively as representation of the Northville community.

Duke Exam Is Delayed

Examination of a Plymouth barber on charges of obtaining money under false pretenses from a Livonia bar owner in an entertainment license deal has been delayed until July 3.

Municipal Judge James R. McCann, Livonia Dept. Sgt. James Grody, who headed the investigation, was assigned to Circuit Court.

With Grody absent when the examination was first set Monday, the case was set back at the request of the prosecutor's office and Attorney Marvin R. Stempien.

There will be no meetings during July, August, and September.

Duke was arrested by Livonia Police after Rogala gave him an envelope containing \$200 in \$20 bills and the 48 pieces of paper.

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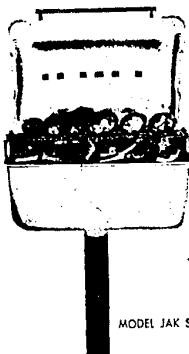


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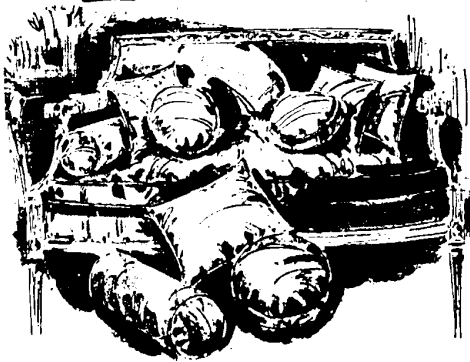
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
