FARMINGTON TOWNSHIP PLANNING COMMISSION MINUTES OF REGULAR MEETING MAY 25, 1967

The Farmington Township Planning Commission held a regular meeting on May 25, 1967 at the Dunekel Junior High School, Farmington. Meeting was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Mr. Larson, Chairman.

Roll Call: Members present were Larson, Stoller, Gardhouse, Maren, Richardson, Nankervis, Jarrett.

Members absent were: Oppenheimer, Maren, Mr. Brennan, Township Attorney, present.

Mr. Lemmon, Consultant, present.
Mr. West, Staff Secretary, present.

Approval of Minutes
Motion by Maren, supported by Nankervis, to approve the minutes of the Minutes of Last Regular Meeting of the Planning Commission, dated April 27, 1967. Motion approved unanimously.

Agenda for this evening is approved with the following additions: Item 11. Letter appearing in the local newspaper in regard to criticisms of Township Officials. Item 12. Mr. Lemmon's report concerning the vacating of Astor Street.

Consideration of an addition to Township Ordinances that will delineate the proposed B-4, Planned General Business District, and be designated as Sections 950, 951 and 952 thereof.

Mr. Lemmon distributed a current copy of the proposed B-4 and discussed the changes with the Commission.

Motion by Maren, supported by Nankervis, to refer to Public Hearing the proposed addition to Township Ordinances known as B-4, Planned General Business District, which is delineated in become Sections 950, 951 and 952. Public Hearing to be held June 22, 1967 at the Meeting of the Planning Commission. Motion approved unanimously.

The following two items were taken care of at the May 4, 1967 Planning Session Meeting. (See Minutes of such):
1. Update of 1946 Highway Plan by the Inter-County Highway Commission of SE Michigan.

2. Mr. Lemmon's report of "Housing Classification."

The Planning Commission has proposed a joint meeting with the Township Board to consider better understanding of proposals that are arising.

June 19, 1967 is the tentative date set for this meeting (third Monday in June).

Reopening request: Nine lots in SE 1/4 of Section 10, located on the west side of Orchard Lake Road, 1500 feet north of Twelve Mile Road. These are part of Parkhill Subdivision. Request is to rezone from RA-2 Residential to B-3 General Business District in permit construction of a drive-in restaurant area. John Palomaki is applicant and Daniel C. Scanlon is owner.

The Proponent was not present at the time this matter came up before the Board. Thus, the following motion was passed:
Motion by Maren, supported by Gardhouse, to table this matter due to the fact that the Proponent was not present. Motion approved. (The Board abstaining.) (Larson.) (See last paragraph in these Minutes.)

Reopening Requests: Approximately 19.59 acres in Section 13 to 5.56 acres in Section 13. Request is to rezone these two parcels from RA-2 to O-1 Office. This is a proposed Office and Athletic Club Site. Proponents are Thomas and George Duke. Thomas Duke explained the preliminary plans and outlined the property value.

SECTION ONE: "The experts who spoke at the various study committee meetings agreed that there are no legal barriers to consolidation either two cities or a city and a township. Hence, a vote for incorporation would not affect, in the long run, a future step toward consolidation."

"And it would most certainly give the residents of the present Township a greater degree of self-determination if the sword of annexation were not hanging over their heads. If, indeed, the two communities could approach the question of consolidation as legal equals."

"The Council's position is that voting for incorporation in October is voting against annexation shortly thereafter. It further means that there could be a two-year period without either actual incorporation or threats of annexation. Such a situation could be undertaken as to future consolidation."

"If the people do not approve the principal of incorporation in October then it's doubtful that the annexation area could be consolidated."

First priority is incorporation.
"The Council may or may not support consolidation after the study is completed, but only after the residents of the Township have protected themselves by voting for incorporation in Oct., 1967."

Incorporation means that all possibility of annexation of Township territory will have been removed and consolidation can be approached objectively by all concerned.

In short, we are a little bit ahead of the times in utilizing the consolidation study issue in order to sabotage the incorporation movement so that choice Township territory again would be the target for annexation."

Initially encouraged the study committee to concentrate its efforts on whatever portion of the study might possibly show definitive reasons for the regulations, restrictions, boundaries of such districts, defining certain terms used here; providing for enforcement; establishing a Board of Appeals; and imposing for the violation of this Ordinance."

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED by the Township Board of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan:

SECTION ONE: That Section 602 of said Ordinance No. 19 of the Township of Farmington, as amended, are hereby amended in the following particulars:

SECTION 602 — Required Conditions:
1. All principal uses permitted and all uses permissible on special approval in this Article V shall be permitted only after the review of the site plan by the Township Board. Subsequent development of the site shall comply with the approved site plan. Such review of the site plan is required in order to minimize the possibility of adverse effects upon adjacent property; and further, to protect the proper relationship between development features and site plan; and also to properly rezone principal buildings, accessory buildings and uses, and open spaces to one another, and to the traffic pattern effective within and surrounding such development.

SECTION TWO: All multiple family developments shall be provided with improvements for utilities as provided in The Farmington Township Board Ordinance. In those instances where the multiple family development is not planned in a subdivision and where reference is made to subdivisions such reference shall also apply to multiple family developments.

SECTION THREE: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

SECTION FOUR: The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby ordered to take effect upon publication of the Ordinance in the Farmington Observer, Farmington, Michigan.

SECTION FIVE: This Ordinance is hereby declared to be a public use of the Township Board of the Township of Farmington, County of Oakland, Michigan, and shall be held on the 22nd day of May 1967, and ordered to be published in the manner prescribed by law.
