After the survey is completed and results are compiled, findings will be turned over to the Committee for Community Action in Redford Township.

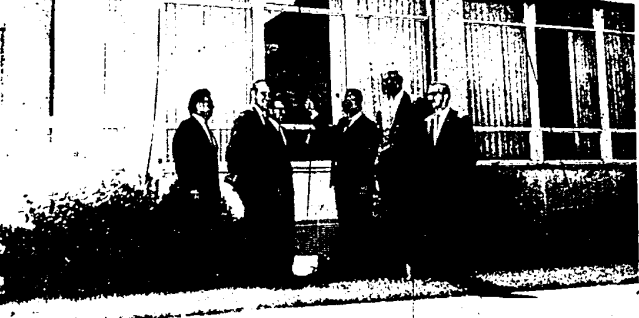
This group, appointed by Supervisor Aldrick Bellare to assist in developing programs, is headed by William T. Shaw.

Bloodmobile Seeks Donors Here June 19 at Church

Livonians who like to contribute to the blood bank when the Red Cross Bloodmobile visits St. Paul's Presbyterian Church on Five Mile Road will have the opportunity on June 19, between 1:30 and 7:30 p.m.

The mobile unit usually sets up a station at the church location in both Spring and Fall, for a day.

Red Cross officials said the church visit is for the convenience of members of the congregation and others in the vicinity who may wish to contribute blood to the bank.

There is no emergency need now, officials said, but the chapter is anxious to keep its bank up to par, especially around holidays when accident toll can be high. They want plenty of blood available, when needed by hospitals.

The bloodmobile visits the Livonia Red Cross headquarters at 31228 Five Mile Road each month on the third Thursday, where donors can appear. Factories also, in many instances, contribute to the cause by special arrangement.
