

# Norma Peters: Woman Of Many Interests

As the wife of Farmington School Board President Richard H. Peters, Norma Peters is well aware that any remark she makes in public regarding school affairs is subject to scrutiny by her listeners.

"I always preface my remarks with this is my opinion," she says. "And it always is. Rich never comes home and talks about what goes on at board meetings."

"I get all my information from the paper, just as I do about all civic affairs. It's really better that way."

Interest in civic affairs has led to Mrs. Peters' active

membership in the League of Women Voters.

SHE COMBINES this with an avid interest in a wide range of cultural activities.

Artistically inclined, she says that after meeting her husband on a blind date during his senior year at the University of Michigan, she was very impressed with him because "he would take me to plays. Not very many college students take you to plays."

The Peters still attend the theater frequently and love to haunt art galleries. Her sister-in-law once called her "goody" because she took her sons when they were under five to a Picasso art exhibit.

"I thought they ought to see it," she says now.

She has trained her artistic bent on accessories in her home and has some beautiful pieces in power and crystals.

HER DEEP BROWN eyes that go with her red headed coloring twinkle when she talks about her curtains.

"I made them during one of the busiest weeks we ever had. My father-in-law was getting married, I gave two dinner parties, attended a luncheon meeting with Rich, went to a cocktail-dinner party and the wedding AND the reception. But they got done."

"You might say I work well under pressure. And it's true."

Another outlet for her artistic

talent stands in a corner of the Peters' living room—a beautiful grand piano. She was taught to play by an aunt who brought her up and today plays for her own enjoyment.

"If Rich had more time, he'd like to take lessons," she says, and then laughs about the possibility of teaching her two young sons, Mark 8, and Bob 10, to play. They are all boys.

Because she loves to read, she thinks that perhaps the boys don't read enough, but questions the wisdom of forcing them to read. She doesn't like fiction, preferring history, and dearly loves the New Yorker, which occupies a prom-

inent place on a living room table.

"I'm not much on house work," she comments, "but I do like to read."

Mrs. Peters is also a U-M graduate and worked for 10 years after her marriage as a dental hygienist. The years were spent working toward buying the home on Longacre where the family has lived for 11 years.

THE HOME is carefully appointed with attention to detail and the lady of the house says, "I used to have candlelight dinners and all that, but when Rich comes home at 6:30 and has to leave for a board meeting at 7:30, that's impossible."

"I don't think people truly appreciate the time and effort that members of the School Board put in. It's a tremendous undertaking."

"They certainly don't do it for the money (trustees are paid \$300 a year). They have to have a sense of civic responsibility."

She has never seen her husband conduct a board meeting and really should because she appreciates his sense of humor which on occasion has stood him in good stead when running board business.

When board members were paid their \$300 salaries at last Monday's meeting, Peters said, "I guess this really could be called a stipend."
