

Girl Waits Decision On Finger

A Farmington Township girl, whose finger was nearly torn off in a truck accident a week ago Sunday, will know by Friday whether or not she will have to have the finger amputated.

Suzie Dubuc, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roger Dubuc, 34691 Brittany, caught in the third finger of her left hand on the stripping on a car door when she had stopped driving to close the car door.

She was taken to Botsford General Hospital and immediately sent to Grace Hospital, Detroit. A neurosurgeon and two other surgeons operated to stitch tendons and nerves in the finger together and managed to save it.

Doctors told Miss Dubuc that if no infection develops by Friday she can still plan to leave July 7 on a YMCA three-week tour of Europe.

The girl, attended Farmington High School last semester and will attend Mt. Clemens High School next year when the Dubucs move to that city.

The contract calls for 15-day vacations up to 17-day vacations for secretaries with six or more years of service. Summertime working hours will be 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. with one hour for lunch provided work schedules can be completed during these hours. Fifteen-minute relief periods are provided each morning and afternoon.

Secretaries to principals, directors and supervisors earn \$4,200 minimum, \$5,000 maximum. The wage scale for business office personnel runs from \$4,400-\$6,000 for bookkeepers to \$3,950-\$5,100 for clerk typists.

over last year's, an 8.7 percent increase. Biggest item in the budget is \$5,440,117 allotted for payment to 666 teachers and 66 additional professional personnel. This may have to require a substantial increase when contract negotiations with the Farmington Education Association are completed.

Supt. Gerald V. Harrison pointed out that the district has a \$1,200,000 cash fund balance and said, "We are in good fiscal condition at the moment, but as we project over the next five years that will be eroded rapidly."

He went on to say that school districts will no longer be able to get advances on state aid and that next year the district will have to borrow funds from a bank to operate from July 1 through Dec. 31 when tax payments

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come in. Harrison also pointed out that approximately 85 percent of the budget goes for personnel and that an increase of 10 percent in staff causes a budget increase.

"But," he said, "we're not asking for staff beyond what we really need to keep up our standards."

The budget called for an 11.5 percent increase in plant maintenance expenditures with most of it caused by the hiring of supervisory workers and maintenance men. According to Harrison, the district has long needed this adjustment.
