Raise Contractor's Fees

Up the electrical contractor's fee from \$25 to \$50 effective Jan. 1, 1968. This brings the fees into line with those set by the state and many of the surrounding municipalities.

Designate Detectives William Kelly and Earl Teeple of the police department the rank of Sgt. Detectives instead of the previous rank of detective. The new rank will not affect the pay scale for the two policemen.

"In the interests of time and lack of an established policy and proper communication, that approval be given to the Farmington Jaycees to place their concession in the Downtown Center as requested . . . for the Farmington Founders Festival of 1967.

"This is not a statement of policy nor a precedent for the future. Further that a definite policy will be established for Festival Committees to use effective 1968 and the Board will expect this policy to be honored.

"Seniority and squatters rights will be given top priority in the establishment of concessions of this policy."

The Festival Committee which grants the concessions was unable to make a decision on the Jaycees request due to the strong objections from the Elks. The committee dumped the problem in the laps of the Board of Commerce, sponsors of the Festival.

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Boys Republic which is housed in Farmington Township.
