

Jaycees Plan Many Festival Activities

Among the busiest people in town during the Founders Festival July 27-29 will be members of the Farmington Jaycees and Jaycee Auxiliary.

Directed by festival chairman, Dennis Phene, members have been busy for days getting things ready.

ONE OF THE events they have planned is Dunk-the-Jaycee, an old-fashioned throw-and-dunk game in which some Jaycees will end up in a tank of cold water. This booth will be at the downtown Center where Jaycees will also have a concession serving Col. Sanders Kentucky Fried Chicken, hot dogs, kielbasa and soft drinks.

Dr. John Richardson will host the serving of chicken barbecue dinners in the City Park. Dinners at both concessions will be \$2 for adults, \$1 for children under 12. They will be served from 4 to 8 p.m.

Jaycee Auxiliary members will sell cotton candy at both Jaycee locations.

Also at both locations there will be entertainment provided by Scott and Marlene Grazier.

And when the Jaycee float goes by in the Festival parade, spectators will get a wave from Farmington's Junior Miss, Sue Lloyd.

Tickets for the dinners may be purchased from any Jaycee or at the concessions during the Festival. One may also purchase a chance on a complete barbecue outfit.

Churches Pre-Date Government

Although Farmington as a village government dates back to 1867, some of its churches are much older.

Farmington's Presbyterian church was founded in 1825 as part of a movement spurred by the Rev. John Monteth, known statewide as one of the co-founders of the University of Michigan.

The Baptists organized in Michigan for the first time in Pontiac in 1819. By 1826 other Baptist churches had been organized in three other Oakland County settlements--Farmington, Troy and Stony Creek.

The Quakers came about the time Michigan became a state. In the early 1830's, strong abolitionists, the Quakers were highly active in the Underground Railroad that spirited Southern Negro slaves to freedom before the Civil War.

Grand River Not First Route West

The Grand River Avenue that now goes through Farmington is not the original route of the Detroit to Grand Rapids road.

Originally in the 1830's, the route followed what is now US-12 from Detroit to Pontiac, Troy and Stony Creek.

Tickets for the dinner will be available at the door. A display of items to be given away at the annual birthday night and tickets for the "Worship Matron's Project" will be at the door.

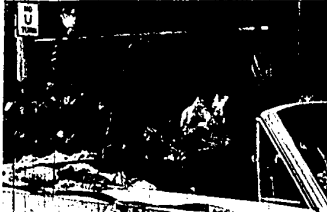
Jaycees To Stage Greased Pig Chase
