Plants Need Nitrogen

Nitrogen in the soil is essential for high grain yields and increased vegetative growth, and is credited with improving soil structure, too.

According to the University of Minnesota, plants need nitrogen in greater quantities than any other nutrient used from the soil.

Under-estimating nitrogen fertilizer needs is more costly

than over-estimating. Excess nitrogen usually is better than too little, because any build-up in the stalk either goes back into the soil for use next year, or produces high protein feed if the crop is used as silage. Too little cuts potential yields and profits.

Efficient, profitable crop production demands that adequate levels of all plant nutrients be available in the soil.
