Inner City Teens Participate In Summer Program at Edison

Fifty teen-age high school students are well into their summer work program at the Detroit Edison Company according to Syl Leahy, vice-president in charge of employee relations.

The company acted in response to a request by the President of the United States to make this summer one of "opportunity" for underserved young people throughout the nation.

The President's request was personally delivered to 30 Detroit area business, labor, civic, and government leaders by Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey at a meeting at the Veterans Memorial Building. Walter L. Ciesler, chairman of the board of the Edison Company and chairman of the business advisory leadership council of the nation's Office of Economic Opportunity, introduced Humphrey at that meeting.

Leahy characterized the program as "in keeping with Edison's responsibilities as a good corporate citizen of this community" and said that the company was cooperating with the President in this endeavor to keep youngsters gainfully occupied during school vacation.

Featured speakers from "down under" in Australia plus world leaders from various parts of America, including the nearly 20,000 Adventists who attended the 99th Annual Camp Meeting at Grand Lodge.

With the avowed purpose of recharging their spiritual batteries campers have left regular employment to rough it under canvas, in cabins, or campers for the 10-day convocation which ended Saturday night, Aug. 5.

Grounds for the encampment are the 52-acre campus of Grand Lodge Academy, one of five secondary schools in Michigan operated by the church. Some 3000 "permanent residents" lived in 651 tents, 350 permanent cabins, 300 trailers plus scores of individually owned tents. They turned the area into a temporary town whose water, electrical and other needs approximately equal those of nearby Grand Lodge.

Meetings began at 8:30 a.m. and continued throughout the day, concluding with the evening meeting at 7:30 p.m. Large auxiliary auditoriums and tents provided specialized daily programs for six divisions of children and youth from one through thirty.

Already plans are under way for camp meeting next year which is expected to be the largest ever. It will be the Centennial anniversary of Seventh-day Adventist Camp Meetings which began at Wright, Michigan in 1868.

Here's Guide For Buying Dressmaker Scissors

A pair of bent-handle dressmaker's shears and a pair of scissors make up a minimum set of sewing tools, says Bernice J. Sharp, extension clothing specialist of The Pennsylvania State University.

Shears are for heavy cutting jobs. The bent handle allows the blade to lie flat against the cutting surface and there is less tendency to lift the fabric from the table while cutting.

Openings in the handle are not the same size so you can insert two or three fingers in the largest opening and the thumb in the smaller opening.

Scissors for lighter cutting jobs and for trimming, have the same size openings in the handle. Buttnhole scissors have adjustable cutting edges and are for cutting uniform size buttonholes.

Sharpness is an important quality of good cutting equipment. Buy good quality tools and resharpen as needed. Select shears and scissors with blades that are connected with an adjustable screw so you can keep the blades in proper adjustment.

If you're left-handed, you might like left-handed shears and scissors, suggests Miss Sharp. Electric shears may be a wise buy, for they save time and do a good cutting job. You can use them for bulky fabrics as well as for lightweight ones. But you must do all cutting on a flat surface, she adds.
