Senator Beebe Praises Implied Consent Law

Senator N. Lorraine Beebe who serves Redford, has hailed Governor Romney's signature on the "implied consent" bill as a strong step toward helping rid the state's highways and streets of drunk drivers. "This bill merely requires that an applicant for a driver's license agree to take a sobriety test if he should ever be arrested on suspicion of driving while under the influence of intoxicants," she said. "This does not take away anyone's rights. The right to drive a car on the public streets and highways is not an absolute right. It is a privilege and carries with it certain responsibilities — one of them being the responsibility of a driver to remain sober or let someone else drive. "Persons with poor eyesight or with infirmities that make them poor risks cannot obtain drivers' licenses. Persons with bad driving rec-

ords may lose their licenses. Implied consent is merely another requirement for a driver's license. Traffic safety was one of the principal points of Mrs. Beebe's election campaign. She was assigned to the conference committee which settled the differences between Senate and House versions of the bill. 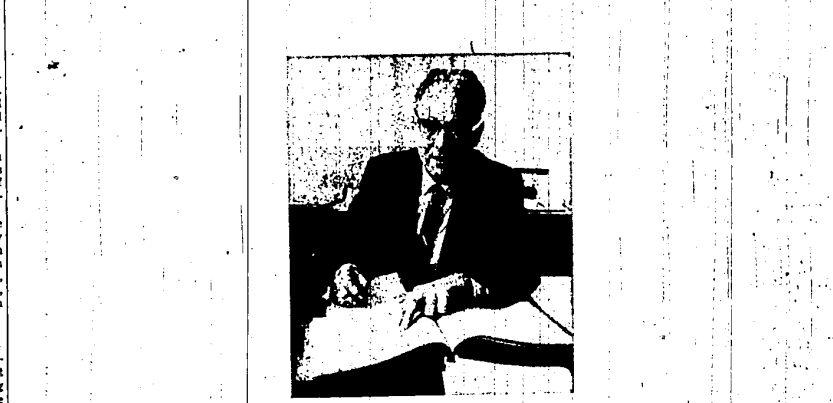
