### Mills Featured In 1800's

Among the nocessities of libs for any pioneer village were a main street for business. A second of the sawmills and sawmills.

Farmington was no exception in its early days.

Arthur Power, the first 1884, settler, began building a sawmill after completing his house on the north side of the local creek that flows into the Ronge River.

By 1826 the mill was inopera-tion, but Seeley's History of Oakland County, reports "it never amounted to much on account of an insufficient water Dower."
