

College Conference Time For Student Christians

Two busloads of Young Christian Scientists from this area joined 3,000 fellow college and university students in Boston today for a three-day conference.

Everything from pre-marital casity and the "identity" crisis to the problems of emerging nations and world peace will come up for discussion at the session, to be held at the denominational headquarters of the Christian Science Church.

Eighty from this area, including chaplains, left downtown Detroit by Greyhound bus last night and arrived in Boston today. They plan to return Monday.

Among the students were Earleen Philip, Michael Hepprich, and Carol Yahn, of Plymouth, David Kelly, and Christine Petty, of Livonia and Dick and Jim, of Farmington. Jonathon Tait, whose home is in England, also is with the delegation from this area.

The conference is open to any student from any college or university who is a member of the Mother Church.

From a modest beginning 12 years ago, these student conferences have developed rapidly into a major biennial event. Chartered buses, planes, and group flights have been arranged by many of the students coming from distant points, including England, Germany, and Australia.

Previous conferences have also drawn students from countries of Eastern Europe, Africa, Asia and Latin America—with 887 colleges and universities of 36 nations represented. More are expected.

During the three-day period, some 19 hours will be spent in assembly sessions, with most of this time given to student papers and discussion.

One of the objectives will be to explore the relevance of Christian insight as a radical healing force in the whole range of human experience. Among the subjects scheduled for consideration are: cheating, drugs, the "morality" birth control, the "death of God" theology, spiritual values in the creative arts, resolving social conflicts, and leadership in government.

A special guest speaker will be Dr. Harrell Beck, Professor of Old Testament at Boston University. The keynote address will be given by Edwin D. Claham, Editor in Chief of The Christian Science Monitor.

A number of Christian Scientists distinguished in various professional fields

will also participate. The list includes Alan Young, actor and entertainer; George Hamlin, Associate Director of the Loeb Drama Center at Harvard; Dr. F. Karl Willenbrock, Provost of the State University of New York at Buffalo and former Associate Dean of Harvard University's Applied Physics Department; and Sir James Butler, one of Great Britain's leading historians, in charge of World War II archives.

Most of those attending will be members of Christian Science organizations that have sprung up under student leadership on some

480 campuses since the birth of the movement. There are several hundred additional informal groups.

The first organization to be officially recognized was at Harvard in 1904. By 1910, seven more had been added, stretching across the coun-

try from Columbia University to the University of California at Berkeley—and including Cornell, University of Michigan, University of Illinois, University of Minnesota, and University of Kansas.

Livonia Woman Edits New Jewish Magazine

Mrs. Marilyn Rosenthal, of Livonia, is editor of a new magazine "Humanistic Judaism."

The twice-a-year magazine, which published its first issue in June, has as its stated purpose "to examine the religious dilemma which confronts the modern Jew."

Assisting Mrs. Rosenthal, who is an English lecturer at Eastern Michigan University, will be poet Judith Goren, and I. W. Rozian, staff member at the University of Michigan, will edit a regular science feature.

Backers said of the new 44-page publication: The "Littles"—those limited circulation magazines that play an important part in the intellectual life of America—have a promising newcomer in their ranks.

"It is the brainchild of a young group of radical Reform Jews from in and near Detroit. (Although the group takes its religious lead from the controversial Rabbi Sherwin Wine of the Birmingham Temple, the publishing venture is completely independent of the Temple. Rabbi Wine has received national attention for his new philosophy of Judaism."

"Humanistic Judaism" makes it clear it will not confine its explorations only to its own faith. It plans to concern itself with the entire area of contemporary religion, particularly the relationship between religion and science.

Writers in the first issue include Dr. Alvin Rabins, professor of philosophy at Hebrew Union College; Khoren Arisian, Jr., leader of the Boston Ethical Culture Society and Dr. Alex Hershaft, an aerospace scientist who writes on problems of religious freedom in Israel.

The winter issue will feature articles by Dr. Joseph Blau of Columbia University; Dr. Leroy Augustenst, of Michigan State University; and Dr. Irving Sigel, of the Merrill-Palmer Institute of Detroit.

Rabbi Wine Will Discuss Integration

"Negro Integration—Yes or No?" will be the topic of Rabbi Sherwin Wine's talk at the Birmingham Temple service, Aug. 25, at 9 p.m. in Robert Frost Junior High School, Oak Park.

Rabbi Wine said he would consider the question that, with the rise of Negro militancy and black power leadership, "the integrated society no longer seems to be the ideal of Negro youth."

"After the year of student black nationalism, it is important to evaluate its effects," he added. "Are they progressive or reactionary?"

A discussion period will follow the talk.
