

Discover Body in F'ton Twp.

The partially decomposed body of a 15-year old boy was found by three township youths Saturday afternoon in a field in Section One.

Police withheld the names of the dead boy and of the youths who found the body which was discovered in a field near Rockridge and 14 Mile Rd.

Township police said that there was no evidence of any criminal act and that the evidence was being sent to the state health department lab in Lansing. A final ruling is expected by next week.

Police said that the boy had apparently been dead for about two days when found. The youth was not from Farmington according to the police.

Identification was made from the clothing and the dental work according to a police department spokesman.

Walters accepted Francis' plea of not guilty and set a cash bond of \$500.

Francis is scheduled to be tried for reckless driving in Novi Justice Court on Thursday. The case was taken to the Farmington Township Court when Novi Justice of the Peace Emory Jacques was on vacation.

Francis told Pheneay that he had the switchblade knife because he wanted to send it to his brother in Viet Nam. He claimed that his brother had told him that he wasn't getting the right kind of weapons for fighting. The Judge said that Francis should let the Army worry about weapons for his brother.

On Aug. 18 a city resident called police and said that a car has stopped next to his house but no one got out.

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Oakland U. Division Schedules 260 Classes

Almost 260 courses are being offered by the Division of Continuing Education at Oakland University this fall. A majority of the classes will begin the week of Sept. 25 and will be held evenings from Monday to Friday on the university campus.

In addition to traditional and well-established programs scheduled each term by the division, several new courses are being offered this fall. Included among them are "Cervantes in English Translation," a creative writing workshop, and a course in the appreciation and history of Japanese art.

"American Foreign Policy since 1940," a Political survey of South Asia, "The Psychology of Adolescence" and "Group Dynamics" are some of the other liberal arts courses in the catalog. "Ghetto Life," "The Proper Study of Mankind: Man," and "Biological Foundations of the Family" are other new courses.

In the professional development and science and mathematics field, many new courses are also scheduled. These include a C.P.A. Review course, much longer than normally offered. This one covers a total of 90 hours of instruction over a period of approximately eight months and will be presented by Donald R. Barry, C.P.A., of Eugene A. Moore and Company.

This will be a review of accounting practices and related theory based principally upon actual examination questions. At least 28 accounting areas will be considered including cash and accrual method, value of stock, stock dividends and net worth; incomplete data-error; and corrections; partnerships; consolidations; cost accounting; and municipal and institutional accounting.

Simplified cost accounting provides non-technical data to unscramble complex theories, using material to help the student develop a basic understanding for making effective use of cost accounting in industry.

"Up-dating Today's Executive" is the provocative title of another new course exploring current efforts in management philosophies and applying new approaches to the needs of middle and upper management.

Harry Van Hook, director of training, Pontiac Division, General Motors Corporation, Clark W. Cooley, supervisor of labor relations and management development in the QM Styling Division, and W. E. Jackson, administrator of education and training at Chevrolet will be the instructors.

There are two new advertising courses, one an introduction for business executives and educators; the other a basic course in advertising design.

Several courses are planned in the communications field including an "Introduction to Broadcasting Techniques" to be taught by Dwayne Rife, of WJW-TV, Channel 4.

In addition to fundamentals of English usage, composition and report writing, there is a self-development laboratory and lecture series on communications for engineers and scientists, and a 12-week program in corporate and community journalism.

President of Western Underwriters Corporation, Jack A. Horwitz, will lead a study of today's insurance industry with emphasis on its current application to the business community.

Oakland County is currently exploring the idea of a regional land fill dump in the Lake Orion area for the southeastern portion of the county. The council stated that it would be approximately two years before the city reached a basis in rubbish disposal and stated that it preferred to wait for the results of the county study.

Went on record as in favor of a "Uniform Emergency Telephone Dialing System," as proposed by the City of Madison Heights. This system, which would provide for the same emergency police telephone number throughout the county, is expected to go before the Michigan Municipal League annual meeting for adoption.

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
