

Schools Get New Principals

There will be new principals in the McKinley and Harrison elementary schools when the new year opens Sept. 5.

Supt. Benton Yates announced appointment of Robert J. Grainger to take over the McKinley vacancy caused by resignation of Berge A. Minasian, who has taken a post as principal in the Bonita, Calif. unified school district. He had been in the

Livonia system 9½ years as principal at Adams and McKinley, after teaching in Jefferson and McKinley elementary schools.

Robert E. Adams, a teacher in Adams elementary school from 1961 to 1966, has been elevated to principal at Harrison. He was administrative intern at Webster School last year. He got his bachelor of science degree from Auburn University and a master of arts degree from Eastern Michigan University. He has a wife and child.

Grainger got his bachelor of science degree in education at Wayne State University in 1951 and his master's degree in education in elementary administration and supervision there in 1955. The educational specialist degree was awarded last year at Eastern Michigan University. He taught in Detroit and Highland Park schools, came here in 1956 and in 1957 became principal at Harrison. He has a wife and two children.

An unknown man sexually assaulted an eight-year-old girl in Farmington Township on Aug. 12, according to the police.

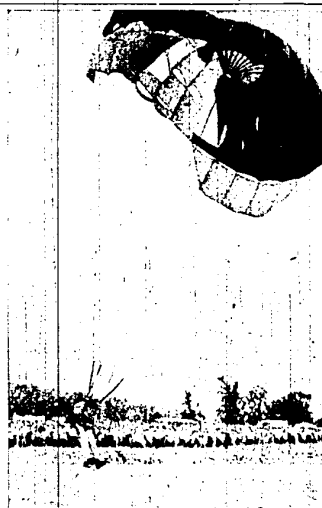

Sky-Divers Perform Feats At Wonderland

Six members of the All-American Sport Parachute Team of Detroit are planning to drop into Wonderland Center Saturday.

And when these sky-diving enthusiasts "drop in," they do it in spectacular fashion — like from 1,500 feet.

For the fourth year in a row, Wonderland will present exhibitions of aerial acrobatics high over the Center at Plymouth Road and Middlebelt. The shows will take place at 11 a.m. and 2 p.m., weather permitting.

After falling with unopened chutes for nearly 60 seconds, the chutists will float to earth, aiming for a 10-foot circle on the field immediately west of the Wonderland parking lot.

The jumpers, most of whom are former members of the 82nd Airborne Division, include Dave Thrapp, of Livonia; Allen Beach, Ann Arbor; John Lewkowicz, Taylor; Chuck Shannon, River Rouge; and Bob Radowick, of Detroit.

The group has a combined total of more than 3,000 military and sport parachute jumps.
