## Theater Group Finds Home In 2 Westland Buildings

Garden City and Westland members of the Wayne Civic Players, a community theater group, have found not one but two new homes, thanks to the Wayne Community Board of Education.

The school board last week approved a request from the group to use two vacant homes on Harvey Street at Hazelwood for use by the organization which lost its previous home in the Wayne Post Office Annex Building through demolition in that city's urban renewal program.

The two homes in Westland were used by the school district for several years to ease temporary overcrowding at nearby elementary schools during peak enrollments.

However, the buildings, referred to as the Harvey Street cottages, have not been used by the school district for the past year. The school board tried to sell the two homes but the bids were too low and the bids were rejected.

The Wayne Players will have use of the two cottages for no rental fee although they will have to take care of the buildings' upkeep, utilities, and insurance.

Ross Roy, business manager of the theater group, wrote the school district last month that after looking at the two cottages, "I feel that something like this would be quite adaptable to our operation; using one building for storage and construction; and the other for rehearsals."

Roy also pointed out that the theater group, eight years

old, has used the public school facilities in the past for its productions, especially its annual Children's Theatre which has proceeds donated by the Wayne Area Council of PTA's for support of the Wayne clothing bank.

He also said that the theater group "must have a home, a definite place to work and rehearse. Individual interest and participation a suffer greatly when an organization such as ours doesn't have a central and recognized base of operations and have to resort to building and painting in garages and rehearsing in basements."

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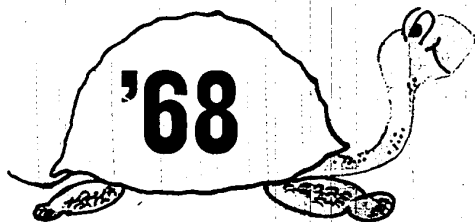
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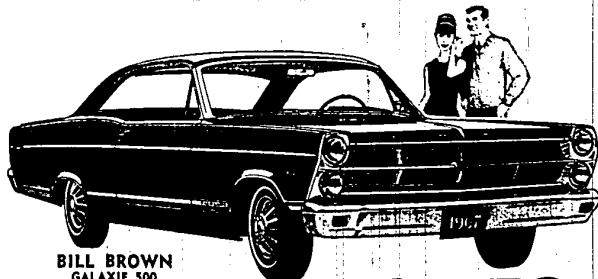
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
