# Federal's Plans City's Largest Downtown Store

Downtown Farmington got a hefty economic boost as construction begins on a new Federal Department Store-the largest commercial enterprise in the city's history.

largest commercial enterprise in the city's history. When it's opened nextspring, when it's opened nextspring, the new store will nearly double the amount of relating space in the Downtown Farmington Center at Grand River and Farmington Road.

"We now have about 17,000 square feet of relail space in 29 stores," said 26 Balden of the Farmington Center Corp. "With this addition, we'll have 70,000 square feet more."
