TO VOTE ON THE FOLLOWING CITY INCORPORATION PROPOSAL:

"Shall the following described territory in Oakland County, Michigan, be known as the 'City of Farmington Hills', be incorporated as a Home Rule City under the provisions of Act 279 of the Public Acts of 1909, as amended:

WHEREAS, heretofore on January 12, 1967, pursuant to Act 279 of the Public Acts of 1909, as amended, a petition was filed by certain resident electors and freeholders of the area, praying for the incorporation of the territory described as:

"Town 1 North, Range 9 East, Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan,"

(which Township is bounded on the north by Fourteen Mile Road, on the east by Inster Road, on the south by Eight Mile Road (also known as Baseline Road), and on the west by Hogarty Road)

excepting therefrom the following described territories:

(a) Those territories previously incorporated as cities or villages; and

(b) That part of Section 1, Town 1 North, Range 9 East, Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan, lying North of Thirteen Mile Road and Northwestern Highway";

as a Home Rule City.

That the form and sufficiency of the petition heretofore filed on January 12, 1967, praying for the submission of the question of incorporation of the City to consist of the territory described in said petition, complies with the provisions of the Act being Act 279 of the Public Acts of 1909, as amended, and is in all respects regular;

That October 23, 1967, be set as the date for a Special Election on the question of incorporating the City.

Every qualified elector present and in line at the polls at the hour prescribed for the closing thereof shall be allowed to vote.
