The Farmington Township Planning Commission will give formal consideration to three (3) proposed amendments to the Farmington Township Zoning Ordinance which would rezone property from present classifications to other permitted uses.

1. The east one-half of Lot 1 of Oakland Hills Orchard Subdivision would be rezoned from RA-2 single residential district to O-1 Office District classification. This property faces Thirteen Mile Road immediately to the east of the Marathon gasoline station at the intersection of Thirteen Mile and Orchard Lake Roads.

2. Property located at the intersection of Twelve Mile and Farmington Roads would be rezoned from B-2 Business District to B-1 Business District. This is the property upon which the Mobil Oil Company gasoline station is presently located. Under the present zoning district the gasoline station is a non-conforming use. Amendment to the B-1 District would permit the gas station to add a new service bay.

3. Property located near the northeast corner of Northwestern Highway and Middlebelt Road would be rezoned from RA-1 Single Residential District to RC-1 and RC-2 (ten units per acre) is located immediately to the south of the Mobil Oil Company gasoline station. The part to be rezoned RC-1 (seven units per acre) is located immediately to the east of property presently zoned for office building uses at the intersection of Northwestern and Middlebelt Roads. The proposed rezoning is a portion of a parcel of approximately 35 acres to be developed by Creative Communities, Inc. The balance of this parcel, including all properties abutting present residential lots, is to remain in the RA-1 Single Residential category.

Any person who may be interested is invited to participate in discussion of these proposed changes. Blue prints and maps clarifying the location of the properties proposed to be rezoned and zoning text may be examined at the Farmington Township office on any business day between 8:30 A.M. and 4:30 P.M.

Petitions were circulated for this work on Alta Loma Drive; Cass; Moore Drive; and Cass Ct. The council has accepted these petitions, but has yet to hold a public hearing on the work.

Township Building Totals \$1,801,684

A total of \$1,801,684 worth of commercial and industrial buildings have begun construction in Farmington Township since January. Gancia-Cote Company, Inc., sheet metal fabricators, have recently completed an 18,200 square foot office and shop located at 24501 Hallwood Ct. at a value of \$257,600. The month of June saw three major construction projects started in the township. The Glen Oaks Corporation

has built a two-story office building at 24503 Orchard Lake Rd. at an estimated cost of \$110,000. It will be located at the Glen Oaks Office Center. A light industrial building costing \$160,000 has been erected by C.L. Rischhoff Co. The building, located at 24115 Industrial Park Dr., has an estimated 20,000 square feet. Also in June two retail sales buildings were built at 15 Mile Rd. and Orchard Lake Rd. valued at \$273,084. Both buildings have an estimated 45,514 square feet and the owner is Allied Super Markets.

In July, Bank of the Commonwealth began setting up a new branch office at 24507 Orchard Lake Rd. The new branch bank cost \$135,000 and has 5,100 square feet. The Archdiocese of Detroit began construction in July of the new St. Clair Basilica Roman Catholic Church. It is termed a temporary prototype and cost \$180,000. It is located at 10 Mile Rd. east of Middlebelt Rd. The church's new pastor is Father Joseph Drogowski. The Farmington Elks Club began construction of their new headquarters at 23600 Orchard Lake Rd. in August. The construction costs are \$163,000 and the building has an estimated 10,000 square feet. In September a \$400,000 manufacturing building was begun at 23235 Industrial Park Dr. The building has an estimated square footage of 48,832. Meyer Weigarden & Sons began a two-story commercial office building at 31171 10 Mile Rd. The building will cost \$40,000 with a square footage of 3,465. Also in September Triple Seal Engineering, Inc. began building an 18,000 storage and warehouse at 31123 West Eight Mile Rd. A shoe store with about 5,100 square feet costing \$55,000 was put into motion at 22300 Middlebelt Rd. by Am-Cal Construction Corporation.
