It is unlawful for any patron of a drive-in restaurant, while on the premises, to race the motor of any motor vehicle, to suddenly start or stop the motor vehicle, or to make any loud or unreasonably noises.
It is unlawful to blow any horn while parked or while on the premises of a drive-in restaurant.
It is unlawful to drink or have in possession any intoxicating liquor.
It is unlawful to congregate for any time whatsoever except in the restaurant building or in the parked motor vehicle.

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Education Week Ideas Abound In South Redford

Schools in Redford Township put their best foot forward next week, American Education Week, hoping to attract visitors.
South Redford Schools, this year, announce a "come and see what is new" theme as the attraction to get local citizens over the school thresholds Nov. 6-10.
The familiar challenge to educators that "we must innovate" to keep up with technological change is expressed in the new data processing equipment which guests can see at Thurston High School during Capsule Classroom night Nov. 8 or any time during the week.
"Not only is the usual welcome mat out at all schools to visit classes and see the daily drama of boys and girls," stated Mr. D. Row, South Redford superintendent, "but many schools are featuring special attractions."

At Pierce Junior High parents will be able to see a 20-40 minute film created by the Pierce Staff in the anthropological museum in Ann Arbor with the use of equipment provided by the school's PTA. The film provides a "real trip" experience for all students in the school through the use of video tape recorder, camera, and monitoring device.
At Rogers Elementary School parents from any part of the district will be able to talk to Mrs. Jeanette Rasmussen, the guidance counselor, who is pioneering in a pilot project which may point to the relevance of elementary guidance on the same level that secondary guidance is now accepted, according to Principal James Burger.
Also at Rogers can be seen after school from 3:45-5:00 an experimental project in reading improvement with selected first graders involving the efforts of five specially trained teachers. Nov. 9 is the special day of

hospitality at Rogers with a reception room, plus refreshments, and hostesses visiting, followed by discussion. Citizens are encouraged to come at any time during the week as well as on Thursday.
At Marshall, group discussion of school activities will be on the agenda for visitors who will have guides to escort them to see various phases of the program.
Visitors to the schools will see improvements in landscaping and paving of parking lots, and they can see the total school in operation while it requires teamwork between many specialists in addition to teachers, according to the superintendent. "Education Week may represent an annual tribute to the importance of the modern classroom," the superintendent added.
